Roy Martin was elected for a three year term, and chairman for the next 12 months.

Allen Hughes was elected to a two year term, and vice-chairman for the next year. Ival Sullivan has served two years of a three year term and will be serving his last year of that term during 1970.

The County ASC Committee is responsible for the local administration of the Federal Farm programs such as: The Feed Grain and Wheat Diversion programs, Commodity Loan programs, Wool Incentive program, Agricultural Conservation program (ACP) and any other programs passed by Congress and directed to the ASC Committees for administration.

In the administration of these programs the Committee must protect the interest of the public as well as that of the participating farmers.

### Army Student Nurse Loan Deadline Set

The winter quarter deadline for nursing students who would like to apply for financial assistance through the Army Student Nurse Program is October 20, Captain Barbara Zebbs, Army Nurse Corps Counselor, noted today.

Captain Zebbs said nursing students in their second or third year of college leading to either a nursing diploma or a Bachelor of Science degree may be eligible to enter the program and receive financial assistance while they attend college. But if they wish to start receiving assistance during their winter quarter this year, they should apply right away.

Applicants for the plan must be between 18 and 25 years of age, citizens of the United States, physically qualified and have high personal, scholastic and moral qualifications. Women applicants must be unmarried.

Students in Oregon and Southern Washington states can get all the details on the financial assistance plan from Sergeant Robert Riggl, Portland Army Nurse Corps Recruiter. He will accept calls (collect if necessary) from qualified applicants at 226-3361, extension 2581.

## Game Commission Stocks Bird Areas

In addition to wild populations of ringneck pheasants, Oregon bird shooters will have around 12,500 pen-raised roosters to line their sights on during the general pheasant and quail season set to open on October 18.

This is the number of adult cocks to be released for the gun by the Game Commission into the various pheasant shooting areas of the state. Good numbers of roosters will be stocked for the opening week-end, with the remainder to be released at intervals through the season.

During the summer months the commission released from its E. E. Wilson Game Farm around 6,000 young birds of the year, which will also be fully grown and available to gunners. An additional 3,500 adult birds, both hens and roosters, were released last spring during the egg-laying period at the farm. Many of the hens were expected to nest in the wild and bring off broods of youngsters.

All birds are released in areas where the general public has access, such as game management areas, refuges and preserves open to hunting, and various farms and ranch lands which are open to hunting by permission.

Although game farm birds provide only a small percentage of the total pheasants taken by

hunters annually, they do provide supplemental shooting in areas of heavy hunting pressure or where populations of birds are low.

Hunters are reminded that the feathered head must be left attached to all upland game birds while in the field or in transit. The feathered head or one fully feathered wing must be left attached to all migratory waterfowl.
