

Sudden Illness Claims Doherty

Paul James Doherty, 54 years of age, died at Pioneer Memorial hospital early Monday morning, October 20, after suffering an apparent cerebral stroke about 6 p.m. the evening before.

He was born August 15, 1915, in Heppner, the son of James G. and Catherine Doherty, and was a life-long resident of this community.

He operated a laundry in Heppner for a number of years. Following an auto accident in which he was seriously injured, it was necessary to close the laundry business. At the time of his death, he was employed at the Kenneth Turner ranch.

He married Charlotte Walker in Lewiston, Idaho, on March 14, 1968. Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, James in Vietnam and Michael in Heppner.

Five sisters, Sara McLaughlin of Tacoma, Nora Turner of Heppner, Margaret Howard, Whittier, Calif., Helen Dyer, Vallejo, Calif., Betty Thorsen, Mountain View, Calif. and three brothers, Francis and Bernard of Heppner and Eugene of Oak Harbor, Wash., also survive him. There are numerous nieces and nephews.

Doherty served as a sergeant in the U. S. Marine Corps and saw extensive action in the South Pacific during World War II.

Recitation of the Rosary was Wednesday, October 22 at 7:30 p.m., at St. Patrick's church. Funeral was Thursday, October 23 at 10:00 a.m. at St. Patrick's with Father Raymond Beard officiating. Concluding services were at Heppner Masonic Cemetery with Sweeney Mortuary in care of arrangements.

Survivors include one brother, Everett Barlow, of Pendleton; three sisters, Mrs. Flora Schunk of Hermiston, Mrs. Dolly Allstott of Gresham, and Mrs. Maude Lutkins of Heppner.

Supt. Daniels reported that the State Sanitation Inspector had visited lone and Heppner schools. The reports were very favorable, with the exception of the need for some additional storage shelving at the Heppner Elementary cafeteria, and some improvements needed in the boys' dressing room at the Heppner Junior High school.

'Big Burn' Set At Penland Lake

Burning of brush which has been cleared in the lake area of Penland Prairie is planned for Saturday and Sunday, October 25 and 26. It is announced by Orville Cutsforth.

The 25 members of the Penland Prairie Corporation are asked to be on hand to help in the "big burn" operations those two days.

Various types of working tools will be needed, as well as 5 gallons of stove oil and butane burners by those who have them. Necessary burning permits have been given for the work.

Construction is scheduled to start at the 70-acre lake next year, according to Cutsforth, with hurdles of work with the Forest Service and Federal Government out of the way, and state approval expected soon.

It will be Morrow county's first big lake, and interest has been growing steadily in its development.
