Mental Health Director Seeks Effective Ways to Help Rural Areas

Members of the County Court, Judge Paul Jones, Walter Hayes of Boardman and Jack VanWinkle of Heppner with others who make up the Welfare Commission, Lloyd Berger of Irrigon, Mrs. Vernon Munkers of Lexington, Earl L. Soward of Lexington and 3-county Welfare director, Lowell Chally heard L. LaVon Wilson, director of the Umatilla-Morrow County Health Clinic at their meeting Thursday. Also present were Grace Drake, Morrow County Juvenile counsellor and Mrs. Charles Heard of the Heppner Gazette-Times.

Mr. Wilson is visiting the rural areas in an effort to find human resources that can be used to an advantage in treating those with mental problems. "Tensions build up," he says, "and sometimes all the person needs is someone to have coffee with, or stay with the children while they get out or someone to show them 'just plain neighborliness'."

He is searching for a solution of problems in the rural areas. He mentioned the use that could be made of the IED closed circuit TV if it were to be brought into Morrow County.
