Stone, better known as "Stoney" has purchased the harness business from E. G. Noble and will continue at the old stand. He recently returned from Walla Walla, where he received a number of weeks thorough instruction in the manufacture of auto tops, and having been in the harness making business for years, handling leather goods, his new line comes to him easy. Mr. Noble will continue to turn out the celebrated Noble saddle, devoting his entire time to the saddle making business.

25 YEARS AGO Thursday, November 30, 1944

An address on wheat problems of the future by Joseph I. Orr, assistant to the administrator of the AAA, and an address by Senator-elect Wayne L. Morse, are highlights of the opening session of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League's seventeenth annual meeting at Arlington, December 7-9, according to the program just distributed by Charles W. Smith, Secretary-treasurer. Gov. Earl Snell will be guest speaker at the banquet Friday night.

A three-column eye-witness account of the Normandy invasion, written by Billy Cochell, Musician 1/e, USN, took up a good part of the Nov. 30 issue. It is most interesting reading, describing care of the wounded and sights and sounds of D-Day.

1 YEAR AGO Thursday, November 28, 1968

Football team of Ione High school came through with its familiar early lightning bolt in the state semi-final B-8 game at Ione Saturday, but Huntington came back with the thunder and won the contest, 66-26. Thus, the Cardinals bid for statewide glory came to an end after one of the most impressive football seasons in the school's history.

Members of Morrow County Grain Growers, Inc., took note of a lean year in their opera-

tions at the annual meeting, Monday night in the fair pavilion, but a spirit of optimism seemed to anticipate a brighter future.

President Barton Clark declared "There is nothing wrong with the company that a good rain wouldn't fix."

A. E. Van Winkle, vice-president of the Spokane Bank for Cooperatives, in the principal talk of the evening, stated that the general financial condition of MCGG is excellent and is a credit to the past management.

Donations Asked For Flag Fund

Secretary of State Clay Myers reports that requests from Oregon servicemen overseas have been so heavy that the Oregon State Flag Fund may be exhausted within six months. Myers said his office has mailed an average of 65 state flags a month to Oregon servicemen, principally in Vietnam, since early summer. "I urge interested citizens, veterans organizations, and service clubs to make donations to the flag fund," Myers said. "Judging from the letters we receive, these flags apparently mean a great deal to our boys overseas, and I wouldn't like to see the fund discontinued."

Myers noted that a legislative appropriation for the flag fund, that was intended to cover the biennium, has been one-third expended since July 1. It costs \$5.59 to mail a flag overseas.

Myers said checks should be made payable to Oregon State Flag Fund, and mailed to Room 121, State Capitol, Salem, Oregon.

Mrs. Lucille Parrish and her sister, Mrs. Tom Fraters of Grass Valley were in Portland Monday to attend the funeral of their niece, Patricia Ann Farrens. Miss Farrens was a freshman at Oregon State University and died suddenly of a rare type of heart disease on Nov. 13. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Farrens of Oak Grove who formerly lived in Heppner and was employed by the Forest Service here about 20 years ago.

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
