

Old Time Wedding Lists Wedding Gifts

(Ed. Note: This is a copy of the Shannon-Cooley wedding that took place at Seymour, Ia. in 1894. For the most part wedding accounts haven't changed so much but in this one the wedding gifts were listed which is quite different. Also the groom's attire is mentioned. The Shannons were Mrs. D. E. Hudson's parents).

On November 8, 1894 about seventy-five invited guests met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thompson Cooley to witness the union of S. H. Shannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Shannon of Seymour and their daughter, Miss Maggie Cooley.

The room was beautifully decorated with white chrysanthemums and everything arranged to represent twilight. Promptly at 12 o'clock the bridegroom and bride were ushered in with Mr. J. W. Shannon and Miss Cora Cooley as attendants. The ceremony was smoothly and impressively performed by Rev. Bott of Seymour, Ia. The bride was beautifully dressed in a white silk and wore a lovely bouquet of white tube roses. The groom was elegantly dressed in black.

After enjoying a nice dinner, the friends of the happy couple repaired to their homes leaving behind them congratulations and their best wishes for the happiness and welfare of the newly married couple.

Mr. and Mrs. Shannon will make their home on their farm near Seymour.

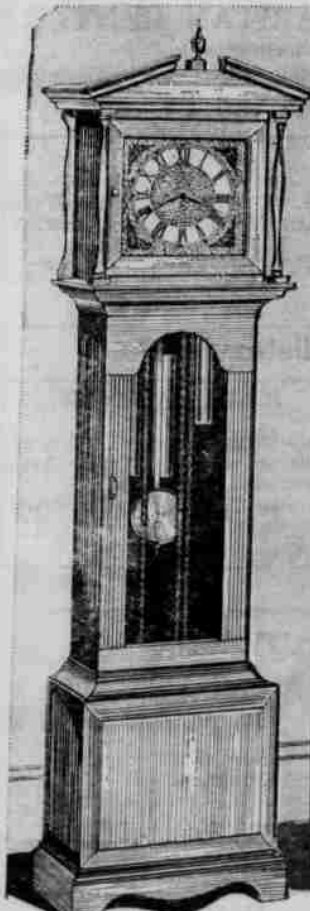
