Good Cooks Equal Good Grades

Thanksgiving week, that is the day when we all eat too much, seems an appropriate week to commend the good cooks at the Heppner Element-

ary School cafeteria. These gals, four of them, all rise and shine and report for work shortly before 7 a.m. every school day morning and get through about 1:30. These four rays of sunshine are Gladys Van Winkle who has been cooking 14 years, 9 of them in Heppner; Betty Orwick, 9 years, Opal Cook, 7 years and Camilla Samples, 5 years.

They say that Pizza seems to be the favorite dish of today's youngster. The cooks make it all from scratch . . . their own dough and sauce. The dough takes 15 to 20 pounds of flour with 3 cups of cornmeal.

They bake 90 percent of the bread. Rolls take 50 pounds of flour and a handful of cornmeal. They use their own ingenuity at using the commodities provided by the government. They get lots of dried beans, flour, butter, rolled wheat, bulgar, powdered skim milk, tomato, peaches, plums, turkey and chicken.

To the Apple Crunch which is a favorite dessert, they add rolled wheat. They serve an average of 350 students a day. Students are charged 25c and 35c for adults.

A sign on their kitchen wall reads, "If it's smoking it's cooked and if it's black it's done".

Ingredients needed for liking their jobs they say are a strong back, sense of humor and a fondness for kids.

The first day they made rolls this little first grader came in and said, "If I knowed you was going to bake biscuits I'd bring some jam". Sometimes leftovers are warmed up the next day and served as extras. This little guy asked if they had some leftovers . . . one of the cooks asked him if he wanted some? "Yes, if it wasn't burned". Kids are so wonderful . . . and so are the cooks!

AT GRIBBLES

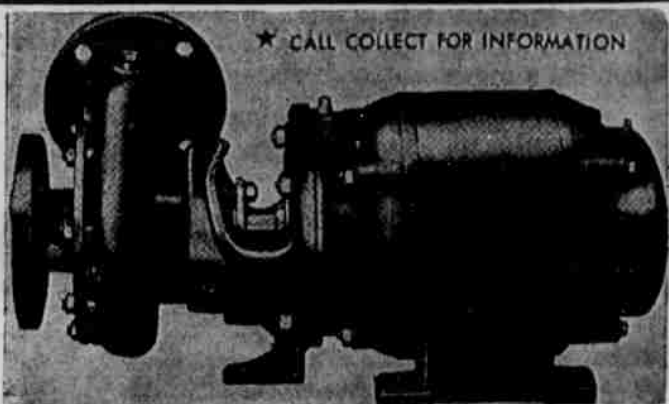

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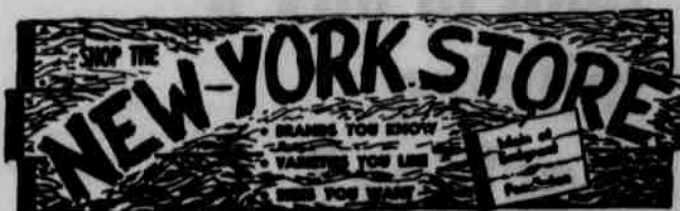
