The businesses are Agri-Management Technology, First National Bank, National Management Corporation, Pacific Data Services, Production Credit Associations and United States National Bank.

The purpose of these meetings is to acquaint farmers and ranchers with these record systems and give them a basis for evaluating their merits. Farmers and ranchers, representatives of banks and other lending institutions, accountants and others are invited to attend.

Also to be discussed at the meeting is an extension sponsored farm management short course to be held in this area this winter.

Royal Arch Masons Elect New Officers

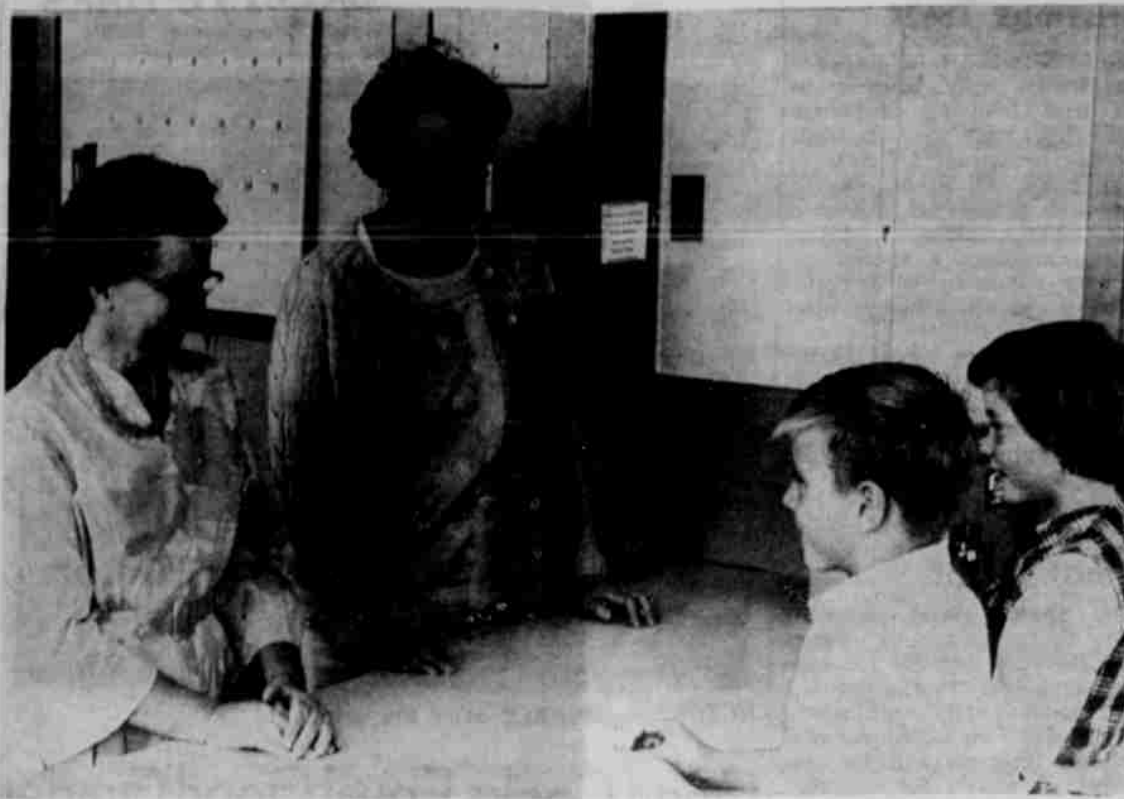
