FIFTY YEARS AGO

Thursday, December 4, 1919

So serious has the fuel shortage become that the U. S. Government is re-evoking the war time order and fuel will be commandeered to those places and plants where the industrial life of the nation is at stake.

The situation in the middle west is the most serious, and the industrial life is being slowly but surely stifled by the coal shortage.

Eight thousand plants in Chicago alone will not be allowed to receive any more coal and will have to close when present supplies are exhausted.

The Heppner Light and Water Co. estimates they have a sufficient supply on hand to insure operation for the next four months, and by that time the coal miners may be back at work and the crisis completely passed.
