Daisy Gillespie Services at Boardman

BOARDMAN — Daisy Ellen Gillespie, 73, wife of Zearl J. Gillespie, died early Monday morning at the Good Shepherd Hospital in Hermiston. She had been a resident of Boardman for the past 43 years.

Mrs. Gillespie was born Dec. 22, 1895 in Colby, Kans., the daughter of James F. and Florence Barlow. She came to Oregon with her parents in 1902 and lived in the Eightmile district out of Heppner. She was married June 6, 1920 in Heppner, and she and Mr. Gillespie lived at Hardman for several years. They then moved to southern Oregon and later to Oregon City, where Mrs. Gillespie taught school. They moved to Boardman in 1926 where they have lived since. She also taught school here.

Survivors are the widower of Boardman; two sisters, Mrs. Roy E. (Flossie) Ball of Boardman, and Mrs. Truman (Leta) Messenger of The Dalles; and two

brothers, Ray Barlow of Eugene, and Ed Barlow of Riverside, Calif. Also, numerous nieces and nephews. Two sons preceded her in death, one in 1948 and one in 1958.

Mrs. Gillespie was a member of the Boardman Community Church and the Greenfield Grange of Boardman.

Funeral services were tentatively set for Friday in Boardman at 2 p.m. with burial at Riverview Cemetery, Burns Mortuary of Hermiston is in charge.

Farm Census Set For January

The 1969 Census of Agriculture will be taken next month throughout the United States, county by county. The census will be taken by mail this year for the first time, announced Harold Kerr, County Extension Agent.

The definition of a farm for the census will be the same as in 1959 and 1964. Places of less than 10 acres will be counted as farms if the 1969 sales of agriculture products are at least \$250. Places of 10 acres or more will be counted as farms if sales amount to at least \$50.

In earlier censuses, enumerators called on all farm operators to complete and pick up the report forms. The 1969 blank forms will be mailed out in January, 1970. The mail method allows farmers and ranchers to complete the report at their convenience, within a reasonable time period, and to use their records as needed. Since response is required by law, farmers who do not return their reports for the census will be contacted to obtain the missing data.

The information received is important to the farmers and to those who serve farmers. Trends and changes since the last census will be indicated so that adjustments can be made in various programs.

Many amateur gardeners have long wanted their own greenhouse, but have hesitated because they just aren't sure what would be "right" for their interests and pocketbooks.

"The Hobby Greenhouse," a new bulletin now available from the Oregon State University Cooperative Extension Service, is designed to give home gardeners some basic information so they can make some sound decisions before starting a greenhouse project, announced Harold Kerr, Morrow County Extension Agent.

The new bulletin covers such subjects as materials for construction, heating systems, ventilation, equipment, insect control and types of plants which do particularly well in a home greenhouse setting. Written by George W. Woodbury, professor of horticulture at the University of Idaho, the bulletin is a Pacific Northwest Cooperative Extension publication for the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. It was reviewed and approved by OSU extension horticulturists for use in Oregon.

Copies of the bulletin are available from county extension offices or from the OSU Bulletin Clerk, Corvallis 97331.

An Alfalfa Shortcourse has been set up for Morrow County alfalfa producers and those interested in alfalfa production as an alternative irrigated crop for Morrow County, announced Harold Kerr, County Extension Agent.

The three day session, one day a week for three weeks, has been planned and organized by the Oregon State University Extension Service Specialists and the Morrow County Extension staff.

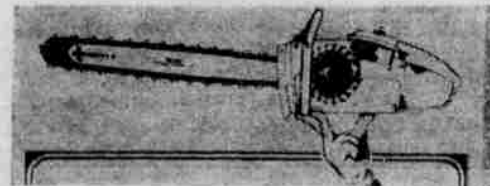
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
