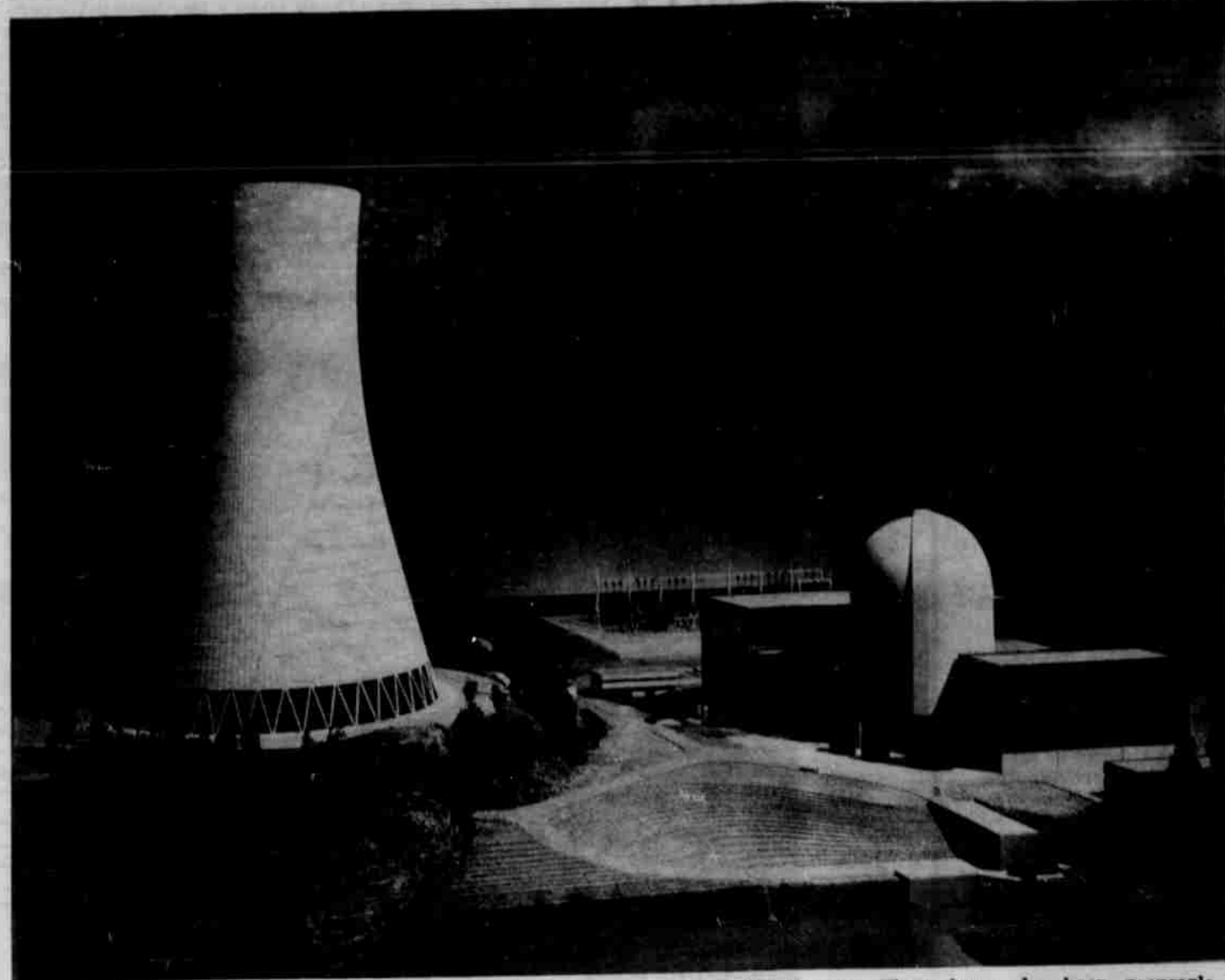

MORATORIUM CALLED ON GRAZING FEE HIKE

Interior Secretary Hickel told Congress last week that he has decided to delay a scheduled increase in fees for grazing livestock on public lands. Hickel stated there would be no additional increase in grazing fees until the Public Land Law Review Commission completes its study of land use.

OCA President Phillips applauded Secretary Hickel's announcement and stated, "This is a major victory for all cattlemen and particularly the OCA and ANCA due to their continuous hard work and activity by many individuals in Oregon and throughout the West."

The first fee increase, from 33c per AUM to 44c, went into effect February, 1969. The Secretary stated that "it is appropriate to delay the next increase until the Land Law Review Commission's views are known. At that time, the Department will take such further action as deemed proper."

Grain Storage Enemies

BEWARE of birds, rodents and insects in stored grains. This is the message from Robert Every, OSU Extension entomologist, who points out that now is the time for growers and warehousemen to take necessary steps to insure that quality doesn't deteriorate while grain is stored.

Every, who just returned from the annual Grain Sanitation Shortcourse at Washington State University, stresses that grain storage areas should be leak proof and screened to prevent entry by birds and rodents.

Moist grain heats, providing a favorable climate for insect development. Stopping leaks before they start in storage areas can prevent costly fumigation the only way of combatting insects in stored grain, he adds.

Insects develop slowly or not at all in clean grain stored at 70 degrees F. or lower with a moisture content below 11 per cent.

However, Every points out, more grain is seized for failure to meet U. S. grade standards because of contamination by birds and rodents than for all other reasons combined. For this reason, it is particularly important for growers with on-farm storage to make certain storage areas are screened to keep birds, rats and mice out.

BRANDING BY LASER

The Veterinary Research Institute in Dallas, Texas reports that future branding may be done at a temperature of 5,000 degrees through the use of a laser beam. Done through a stencil, the branding will be painless as it will be faster than the animal's pain reflexes and will eliminate damage to adjoining tissue.
