The six states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island comprise the New England States studied this year in the annual ACWW study of Home Extension. Mrs. Gene Ferguson and Mrs. Vern Keithley gave the lesson Tuesday at the Heppner Home Extension meeting at the home of Mrs. Grace Drake.

New England was named by Captain John Smith in 1614 and was set led by the Puritans and Pilgrims who were deeply religious, had a special resourcefulness and were conservative by nature and necessity. Whatever their history, the New Englanders have a sturdy heritage and are industrious, proud people.

There are many tourist attractions and getting more popular is their beautiful fall foliage season.

States and their business: Maine harvests 20 million pounds of lobsters. Vermont is best known for maple syrup and winter sports. New Hampshire is a great place for rock hounds and is a great apple growing state with more than 30 varieties of apples.

Connecticut has a unique crop "shade tobacco", a very expensive crop as the entire acreage is covered by a tent cloth. Massachusetts is the top manufacturing state in the nation and is the home of much of our country's early heritage. Rhode Island, the smallest state in the union, known for its manufacture of textiles and jewelry. Forests cover 2/3 of the state.

People in other countries often call all Americans, Yankees. In the South, a Yankee means a Northerner but to most people in the United States a Yankee means a New Englander.
