Each applicant will be notified of the time and place to report for an interview and test. Passing the test is mandatory.

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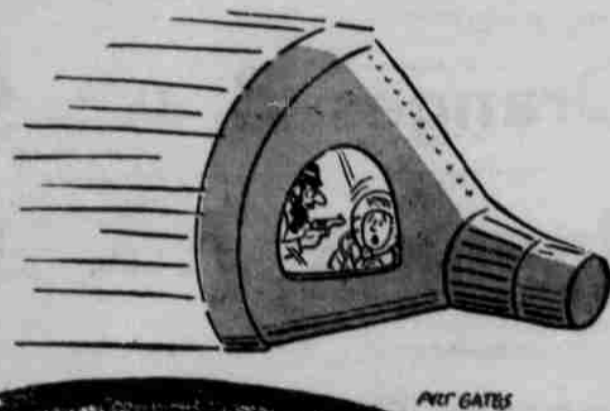
