Back after being out for 71 days is "Familiar Quotations, Passages, Phrases and Problems". This book has now been placed on the Reference shelf.

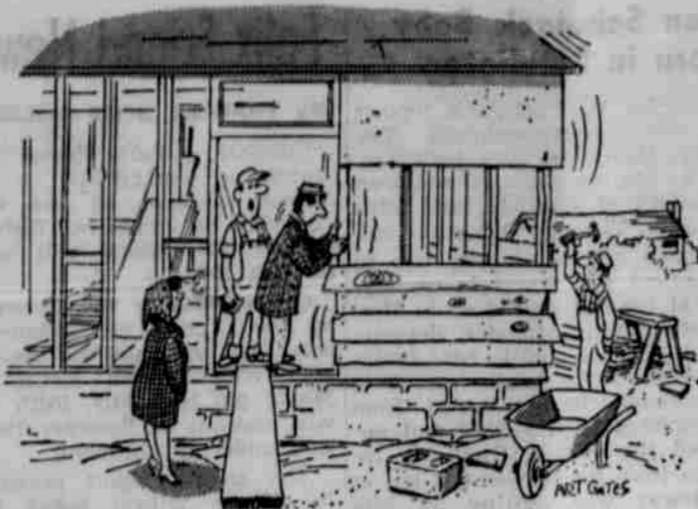
