Leadership Workshop Held in Pendleton

Selected Home Extension and 4-H Club leaders from Baker, Union, Wallowa, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco, Umatilla, and Morrow Counties were in Pendleton Jan. 29 and 30 for a leadership training workshop. Dr. Robert Dyer, Portland psychologist and former assistant counselor with the OSU Counseling Center, was with the group the first day, to help leaders learn how to understand behavior, attitudes of people, and methods of teaching.

This workshop was sponsored by the Oregon Extension Homemakers Council. It was one of five similar sessions held throughout the state. Mrs. James Whittaker, Pilot Rock, past state council president, was general chairman of the statewide event.

Because Home Extension and 4-H Club programs are carried out through the services of volunteer teachers, the state council considers it both necessary and helpful to give leadership training. Such workshops increase teaching skills of the volunteers and help them feel more secure as community leaders. Participants will later present similar workshops throughout the counties.

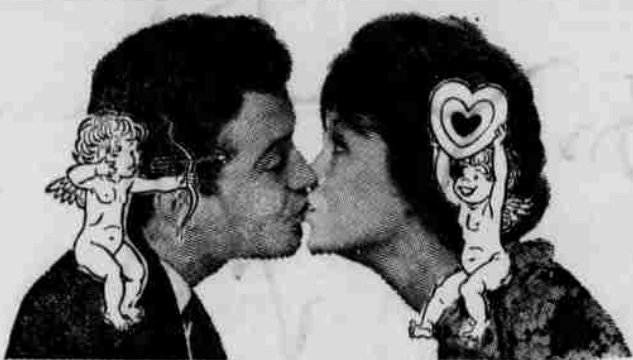
