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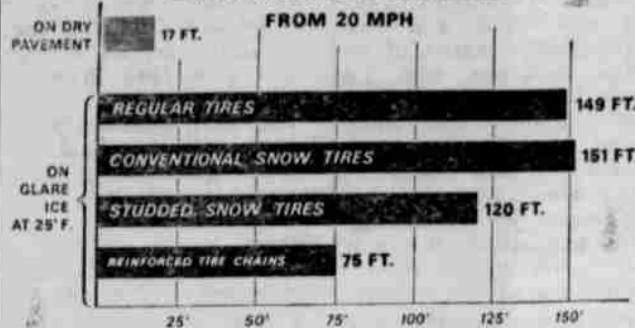
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SKIDDING FOR SAFETY



A skid test trailer used by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards to measure the performance of various types of tires, tire chains and other equipment at its test site in Stevens Point, Wis.

BRAKING DISTANCES



These test results, comparing performance of various types of tires and chains on the rear wheels disclose that conventional snow tires offer no advantage over regular tires in stopping on glare ice. Studded tires reduce braking distance by 19%, and reinforced tire chains by 50%.

Regardless of the type of traction device employed, however, the Safe Winter Driving League reminds motorists to reduce speeds and drive accordingly when pavements are icy.

Boeing Postpones Boardman Testing

The Boeing Company has postponed a scheduled move of its ground stand testing of 747 engines to Boardman, and temporarily will halt work there on test facility construction.

The company cited significant cost benefits and substantial reduction of testing activity at its north Boeing Field site in Seattle as its fundamental reasons for the change in plans. The move to Boardman, however, has not been cancelled and will be made before testing begins on engines for the supersonic transport or the projected B-1 bombers, company officials said.

The change in plans will result in return to Seattle of all but three Boeing employees now stationed at Boardman and suspension there of all present activities.

The company has spent approximately \$200,000 on the projected \$410,000 building program at Boardman. Some work, such as on the test stand concrete and utilities and the control house heating, ventilation, air conditioning and utilities is more than 90 per cent complete. Yard work, road building and

instrumentation also are 70 per cent completed. It is planned to complete the work on the first two items and the yard programs before suspension of activities.

Testing of 747 engines will continue in 1970 at the north end of Boeing Field but at a substantially reduced rate from the past 12 months. The company conducted nearly 800 hours of testing on two stands in 1969 but plans to use only one stand in the coming year for a total of approximately 260 hours.

It is anticipated that work on the facilities at Boardman will be completed in time to conduct SST engine testing on schedule in 1972. Meanwhile, there will be some testing activity, not related to the 747, at Boardman by crews which will be based in Seattle. Some 747 testing will be continued at the Tulalip, Washington site.

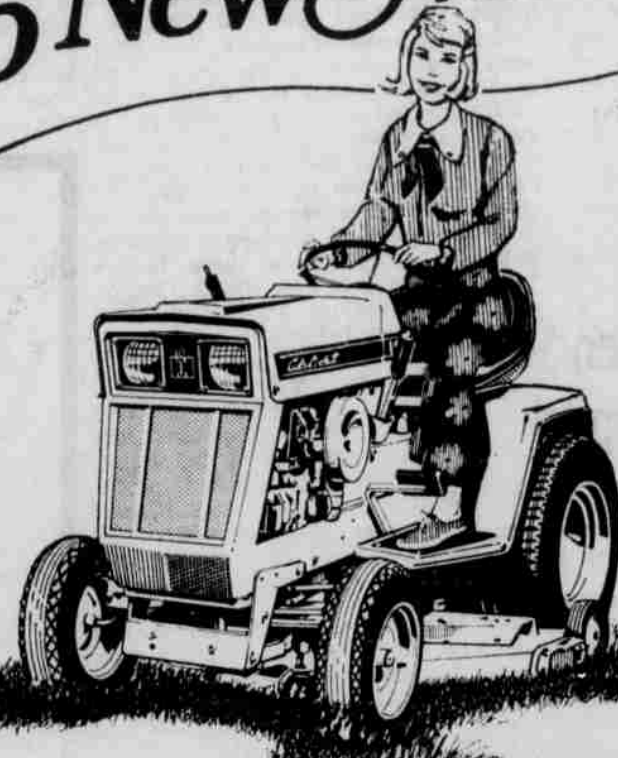
All indications point to a bigger and better show this year.
