

### Children's School To Be Aided by ESA Bingo Party

The major project of the Beta Omega Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority is fund raising for the Children's Hospital School in Eugene.

The Chapter is sponsoring a bingo party on Feb. 18. Proceeds from this activity will go to the Children's school.

The Children's Hospital school has one objective: To make it possible for physically handicapped children to take their place in normal society, to attend regular school, to engage in activities, to become self-sustaining, productive members of society. The school coordinates a program of education and occupational, physical and speech therapy for crippled children between the ages of 3 and 15 who are of normal intelligence.

The teacher's salaries, with the exception of teachers of the perceptually handicapped, are paid by the Oregon State Department of Education, but all other operations costs are met by private donations and tuition charges. The principal source of income is the Easter Seal campaign. In the past years all Oregon ESA chapters have given an average of \$10,000 per year in addition to material donations to the school.

The public is invited to attend the bingo party and share in this worthwhile project.
