

Board Approves School Budget For Year 1970-71

cursed. There are 19 telephones in the county.

The 600 series was approved at \$146,775.

700 Series—Maintenance of Plant

The item for a steam cleaner requested for the bus shed was reduced from \$350 to \$500 because it was felt a more efficient machine could be acquired for the latter price. This year a steam machine has been borrowed from a local garage. All vehicles are brought in every summer for cleaning.

There are 87 typewriters and adding machines in the district to be maintained. Standard Office Equipment from La Grande has the contract for next year for \$2100. Each machine is taken in during the summer and checked and cleaned. Once a month calls during the year are made for minor repairs and general maintenance.

Total estimate for maintenance of plant, the 700 series was approved for \$33,949.

800 Series—Fixed Charges

This includes the public employees retirement system and social security. It seems assured that the social security rate for 1971 will increase to 5.2 from the present 4.8% on the first \$7800 earned. This increased this 851.2 section from \$46,400 to \$49,800.

Property insurance rates may be raised 30%. This may be done over a three-year period or in one year. If in one year, insurance would go from \$15,000 to \$18,000.

The 800 series was approved for \$10,477.

900 Series—Food Services

The Food Services were approved at \$31,890.

1000 Series—Student Body Activities

Officials required for refereeing is expected to be a little less expensive in Class A. Mr. Daltoso of Riverside said that two \$15.00 referees are required for varsity games and two \$7.50 novices are used at the JV games plus \$10 mileage for one car to make a total cost of \$55 for officials. The schools pay half of the cost of officials and the district pays half.

The 1000 series was approved with no changes at \$6,835.
