 Claud Frank Worden, 68, died Feb. 10 in Joplin, Mo. He was a resident of Boardman for over 20 years, leaving here about 3 years ago. Funeral services were held in Joplin Saturday, with graveside services and burial in Payette, Idaho, the first of this week.

Mr. Worden was born Feb. 14, 1901 in Oakley, Kan. He was married to Jessie Faye Holding in 1925 in Joplin. 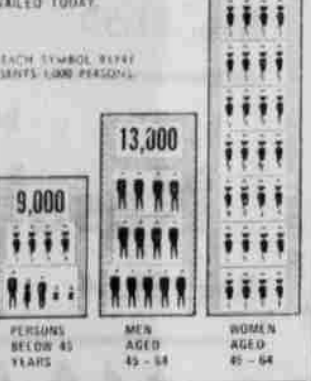
