### Irrigon Council Names Budget Members

IRRIGON—A resolution was adopted by the Irrigon City Council at the February meeting, to become a member of the newly formed District 12 Council of Governments.

Hubert Senn, Billie Griffin, Dan Creamer, Paul Holm, Joe Irish, with Fred Walker as alternate, were named for the budget committee. Recorder, Mrs. Ruth Coy was appointed as budget officer. A date for the first budget meeting will be set at the March Council session.

Other business included discussion of a need for a vacated alley in Block 48 to be reopened to give access to residents whose properties have no Public right of way adjacent to them.

Mayor Chester Wilson reported that Farmers Home Administration had approved expenditure of supervised funds for additional fire hydrants and construction of requested line extensions for 3 additional services. An additional 8 hydrants are planned, bringing the total to 13 and leaving but few homes in the city farther than 600 feet from a hydrant.

Mayor Wilson also stressed the need for action regarding zoning. A comprehensive study

was made several years ago and the plan approved and adopted by the Council but was not implemented by Ordinance.

Formation of the Administrative Districts, such as District 12, will place planning and zoning responsibilities outside municipal boundaries at the County level where previously cities had responsibility for planning to 6 miles outside their borders or half way to the next city if less than 6 miles.

It was noted that census count will soon begin and several houses are vacant in town. The value to the city in having them full was pointed out and all encouraged to pass the word that housing is available in Irrigon.
