Jane Rawlins Tells English Program

At a recent Soroptimist meeting, Jane Rawlins, English instructor at Heppner High School reviewed the steps that led to the development of the new English curriculum at Heppner High School.

She stressed the concern that each student have a chance to develop the greatest power of which he is capable to use the language in Communication. This includes skills in speaking, reading, writing and listening.

Language study — how the language works. Literature to be taught as experience encouraging students to enter imaginatively into the human experience found in plays, short stories, poems and novels. Composition as the shaping of a thought in the mind and so expressing it that it is understood in the same way by the mind that receives it.

After Mrs. Rawlins' talk, Dennis McKay, AV director, set up the TV Monitor and Recorder to show on closed circuit TV the four English instructors in an evaluation session and hear the tape played of their conversation.

Arnold G. Pieper Passes Suddenly

Arnold Grover Pieper, 73, died at his home in Lexington on Feb. 18, 1970. Mr. Pieper had recently been hospitalized in Pendleton but death came suddenly, apparently from a heart condition.

He was born Sept. 29, 1896 in Lexington, and lived in that area all of his life. His parents were John Pieper and Emma Kaiser Pieper. The parents were Morrow County homesteaders and engaged in wheat ranching which Mr. Pieper carried on during his lifetime.

He married Erda M. Frad in Heppner on June 6, 1920 and she survives him. One son, Elmer of Hermiston and two daughters, Mrs. Lavelle Nelson and Mrs. Marcille Hall, both of Portland, also survive, and 14 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren. He also leaves nieces, nephews and cousins in this area.

Funeral services were held Feb. 21 at 11:00 at the Heppner Christian Church with Rev. Don W. Johnson officiating. Special music was provided by Carl and Betty Marquardt with Peggy Johnson as organist.

Port Lays Out Industrial Park

The Port of Morrow Commission discussed plans for laying out 30 lots south of the Union Pacific Railroad and east of Boardman in the port's industrial park at a meeting last Thursday. The lots would be used for a food processing plant area, and would be next to the Finley-Buttes Produce Company, a new plant to be built to pack potatoes from the Nelson-Tucker Ranch south of here.

The port agreed to construct a water conduit under the Union Pacific tracks into the Finley-Buttes plant.

Larry Mills, manager of the Morrow County Grain Growers at Lexington, was appointed as a member of the budget committee. Other members include Jack Hynd, Roy Lindstrom, Vernon Russell and Howard Bryant.

The port offered an easement on port property to the Bonneville Power Administration for a new sub-station that is scheduled for construction later this year.

A resolution was adopted for the port agreeing to become a participating unit in the District 12 Council of Government.
