

Recommendation Presented on Tax Over-charge

J. W. Van Galder with the Oregon State Tax Commission met Wednesday with members of the County Court, Judge Paul Jones and Walter Hayes; County Clerk, Sadie Parrish; Special Assessor, Joyce Ritch; School Supt. Ron Daniels; School board chairman, Jack Sumner and school attorney, Bob Abrams. Also present were Avon Melby of the East Oregonian and Mrs. Charles Heard of the Heppner Gazette-Times.

Prior to his recommendation of what to do about the recent publicized extended error in General fund of a year ago, Mr. Van Galder gave reasons for his recommendation.

There had been no record of a request for a refund, there had been no effort to hide the error, there was no evidence of any hanky-panky only that an honest error had been made.

His recommendation, he said, would be only paper work and no change would be made in the total budget figure for this year.

He said to reduce the cash carry over by the amount collected on the over-charge and then enter in the receipt section the same amount of money.

His recommendation will be presented by Ron Daniels at the budget hearing and board meeting on March 10.

Irrigon Pair Home From European Tour

IRRIGON — Mrs. Al Partlow and Sheryl have returned to Irrigon from a 15-day European tour. Mrs. Partlow and her daughter joined a tour group in New York, and left there Feb. 9, for Rome, Italy, where they spent two days touring the Catacombs of St. Calixtus where an estimated 350,000 Christians are buried, the Mamertine Prison where Paul was kept until he was beheaded, the Colosseum and Forum, Michelangelo's frescoes, several galleries and museums. On Wednesday they visited Vatican City and saw the Pope.

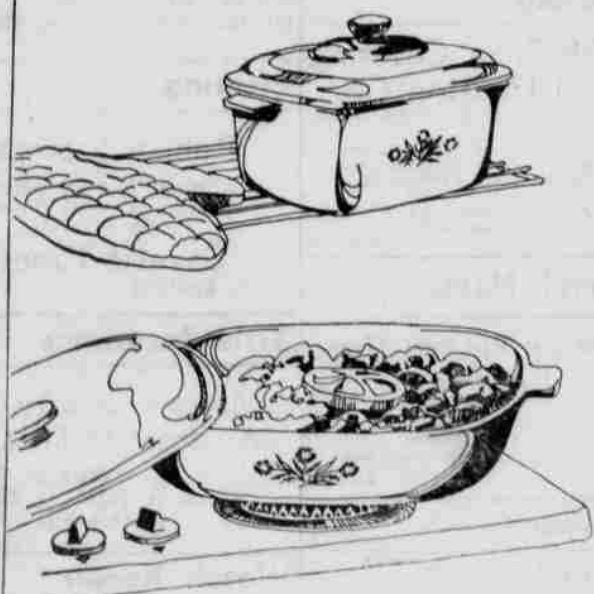
