Mrs. Wilkinson Tells Of Russian Tour

Continuing with their year's program theme "Our Value Patterns and Those of Others", members of Iota Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma at their Feb. 21 meeting in Pendleton heard Mrs. Dick Wilkinson of Heppner describe a tour of Russia she made in Feb., 1969.

Mrs. Wilkinson, with her husband, was a part of a People to People goodwill agricultural tour of European countries including Russia.

She commented on the extreme friendliness of the Ukrainian people in southern Russia compared to the cool reserve of people in Moscow. She noted the emphasis on education even with what seems to be inadequate facilities compared to United States' standards. Many of the elementary students attend school in shifts with the last one running to 9:30 at night. A college education is very expensive, permitting almost anyone to attend; however, the graduate owes the state three years of his life, any job, anywhere, for any pay.

The Russians are very proud that they have little or no un-

employment, but this is achieved by people, both men and women, doing hard manual labor that in the United States is usually done by machine. Mrs. Wilkinson noted that on one collective farm of about 24,000 acres she visited, 2700 workers were employed. The wages are necessarily low in such an operation and most Russians cannot afford a bicycle, much less an automobile.

Mrs. Wilkinson showed slides which gave a graphic picture of her tour and inspired many questions from the Delta Kappa Gamma members.

Mrs. Adrian Becholdt, president, conducted the business meeting and reminded committee chairmen that their state reports are due by April 1. No meeting will be held in March. Maud Alexander, Hermiston member, was honored by the club for her recent election to the presidency of the state Pen Women's Club.
