WHAT'S COOKING?

This Crab Meat Casserole made with diced turkey was one of the delicious dishes at the Heppner Home Extension luncheon Monday at the home of Mrs. Merritt Gray. Mrs. Felix Schwarzin brought it in. She says instead of crab meat she has used turkey, chicken or tuna fish and her family likes them all.

1/2 cup butter melted

2/3 cup flour

2 2/3 cup milk

2 6 1/2 oz. crab meat flaked

4 cups celery, chopped

2 pimentos, chopped
1/2 cup green pepper chopped
4 hard cooked eggs, chopped
2 tsp. salt
1 cup cheese shredded
1 cup butter and flour in a sauce pan. Slowly add milk, cook stirring constantly until white sauce thickens. Add crabmeat, celery, pimento, green pepper, eggs and salt. Pour into a 2-quart casserole. Top with cheese, then bread cubes. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

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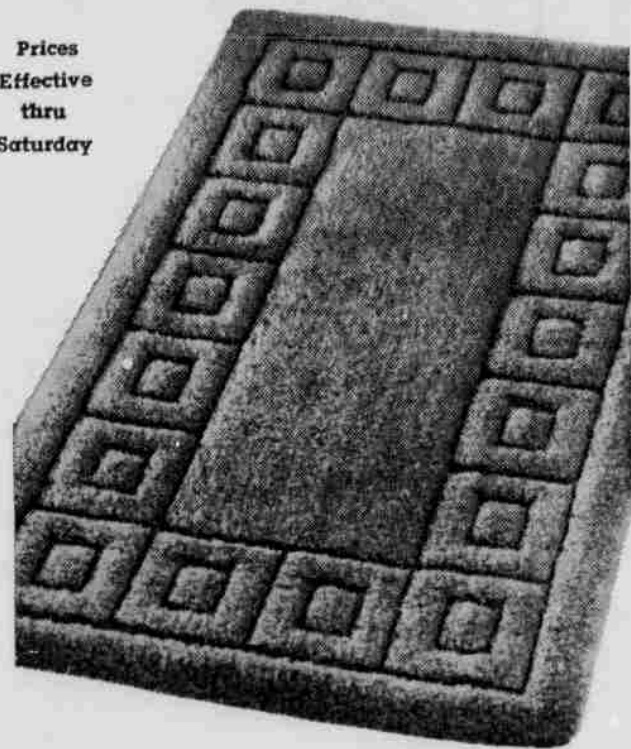
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
