Crumb Topped Cherry Pie
2 1-pound cans tart red cherries
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel (optional)

1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

2 tablespoons lemon juice
Few drops red food coloring
1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell

Drain cherries, reserving 1 1/2 cups liquid. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add reserved liquid; cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add cherries, lemon peel, lemon juice and food coloring. Pour into pastry shell. Combine flour, 1/2 cup sugar and spices; cut in butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over cherries. Bake in 400° oven about 30 minutes or until crust is light brown. Serve warm. Note: Cherry Filling may be used in place of cooked mixture.
