

NOTICE OF SERVICE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX WARRANTS

NOTICE is hereby given pursuant to ORS 311.615 of the service of Personal Property Tax Warrants upon the following listed taxpayers. Payment of the following listed delinquent taxes with interest and costs of service must be made by April 14, 1970, or said warrants shall be filed with the County Clerk of Morrow County, Oregon to be entered in the judgment docket of said county and shall become a lien upon the title to any interest in real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued, and the taxes on personal property embraced in the warrant with interest, penalties and costs applicable thereto, shall continue as a lien on all the personal property of the person assessed as otherwise provided by law. The effect shall be the same as though the people of the county had recovered the judgment against the person charged for the full amount of the delinquent taxes covered by the warrant together with interest thereon and cost as provided by law.

—Materials ordered for water line extensions had been delivered, with additional hydrant materials due for delivery in the next 2 weeks.
