Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, Oregon Constitution.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in School District No. R-1 of Morrow County, State of Oregon, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on April 6, 1970, at Riverside High School, Heppner Elementary, Ione High School, Rhea Creek Grange Hall, Lexington School and A. C. Houghton Elementary in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1970-1971 over the amount limited by section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are:

- Increases in salary for all personnel
- Increases in retirement and social security
- Increases in property insurance

The amount of tax, in excess of the constitutional limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$871,245, which expressed as a rate of levy, is estimated at \$10.40 per thousand dollars of true cash value of taxable property within the district. Dated this 16th day of March, 1970.

Article 16—"The perfection of the Gospel is in the fear of God and in faith . . . for the Gospel teaches an eternal righteousness of the heart." Article 27—"For Christian perfection is to fear God from the heart, again to conceive great faith, and to trust that, for Christ's sake, we have a gracious God, to ask of God, and assuredly to expect His aid in all things that, according to our calling, are to be borne and meanwhile, to be diligent in outward good works, and to serve our calling. In these things consist the true perfection and the true service of God."
