Medical Insurance Deadline March 31

The 1970 general open enrollment period ends for medical insurance under Medicare very soon according to word from the manager for the La Grande Social Security office.

March 31 is the last opportunity for those people born between Oct. 1, 1901 and Oct. 1, 1902, to enroll. In addition, this is the last chance to re-enroll for those who dropped this doctor bill insurance coverage in 1967.

Those already enrolled for supplementary medical benefits need take no action and those born before Oct. 2, 1901 who have never enrolled can no longer sign up.

Those people 65 or over and still working can sign for Medicare benefits even if they plan to continue working. The next visit of the Social Security representative to Heppner will be April 10 from 10 to noon and from 1 until 2 p.m.

Sixth Graders Study Pollution

Mr. and Mrs. John Eubanks are home from a three week's stay at Kennewick. They were there for the open races at the Tumbleweed Race Track.

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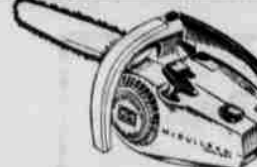
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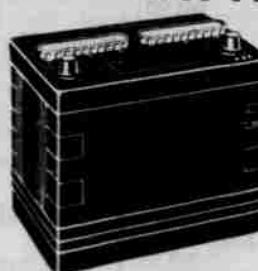
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
