Her parents George Shipley and Lydia Jane Swearingen Shipley came west by covered wagon from Missouri in 1853 and settled near Munroe. They came to Morrow County in 1880 and homesteaded on Black Horse. He was a brother of Dr. Louis Shipley, Morrow County's first licensed medical practitioner.

Sib, as she was called by her family and friends, was born in Heppner July 22, 1891. She married Richard Wells in Portland, her cousin, Mrs. Bruce Bothwell remembers. Her brother-in-law Jake Wells was assessor for many years. Sib worked in the assessor's office. Her husband was a barber. He died in 1954.

She was active in her church, All Saints' Episcopal and in the American Legion Auxiliary. She also enjoyed the activities of the Lady Elks.

She is survived by her sister Evelyn Ferguson of Los Angeles. Mrs. Ferguson suffered a stroke last summer and won't be able to come for the services. She is also survived by numerous nieces and nephews.
