Basements Offer Fallout Protection

The new Morrow County Community shelter plan provides for many people to make use of fallout protection in the basement of their homes in the event of attack if they elect not to travel to public shelter, according to Clarence Bauman, Director of Civil Defense.

"One goal of our community shelter planning project is to tell every citizen where the best available fallout protection is located", Bauman said.

According to Bauman, the department of defense has found that homes with basements offer much better protection than was realized even a few years ago.

The official information to be distributed Monday, May 4, 1970, will tell people in all areas of Morrow County where they should seek fallout protection in an event of an attack upon this country. Although most of the available public shelter is found in the John Day and McNary dams, many persons in Morrow County may choose to use private shelter in the basements of their homes. These can offer substantial protection, director Bauman said.

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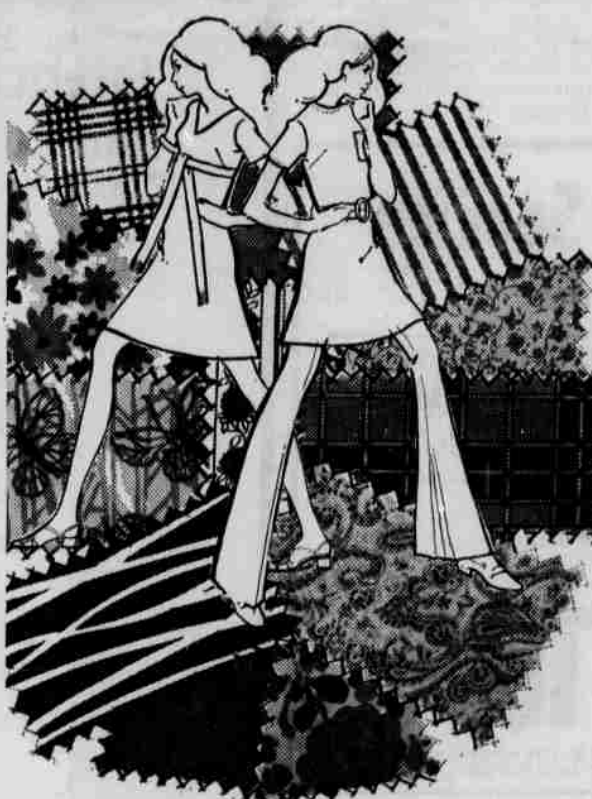


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
