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Wheat, Feed Grain Outlook for State Told by Economist

Prices for new-crop wheat and feed grains later this year will be influenced by the size of carry-over supplies and production in Oregon and other competing areas.

Meanwhile, farm prices for Oregon grains for the remainder of the current marketing season are likely to hold around current levels and near county loan rates, says S. C. Marks, Oregon State University extension agricultural economist.

Marks makes his comments in the quarterly Oregon Farm and Market Outlook circular, just published by the OSU Cooperative Extension Service and available through county extension offices, according to county agent Harold Kerr.

Oregon cash wheat prices in Portland and producing areas in early March were holding at prices about five to six cents a bushel higher than last year. Supplies of white wheat are slightly smaller than a year earlier as export movements have been a bit larger this season.

Prospects of some increase in export volume coupled with export subsidy payments and heavy placements of wheat under the federal price support loan program are the principal price bolstering forces, he notes.

The 1970 federal wheat program is almost the same as for the 1969 crop except that it calls for a 12 per cent decrease in acreage allotments, Marks notes. The U. S. Department of Agriculture in December estimated the 1970 winter wheat crop at 118 million bushels less than 1969. Oregon's expected crop of 24.8 million bushels is being grown on 728,000 seeded acres, or six per cent less than last year.

Feed grain plantings will be influenced by the 1970 feed grain program which aims at taking 28 million acres out of national feed grain production to maintain a supply-demand balance similar to 1969, Marks said.

This means that feed grain price levels should be about the same as the current season assuming no broad change in the current world feed grain supply-demand balance, he points out.

It is anticipated that there will be a large carry-over of both oats and barley this year. Stocks were considerably higher at the start of the year than in 1969, Marks said.

Prices could get a lift this spring if growers decide to place large quantities of their remaining 1969 crop under the grain price support program. Growers have until May 31 to request a loan, he explains.

Meanwhile, Marks urges growers to plan ahead for the 1970 crop storage to avoid distress and forced selling which would depress market prices more than usual at the time of harvest. Although no general shortages of storage space are expected, some local areas could be hard pressed at harvest time to provide space for both carry-over stocks and the new crop.
