BOARDMAN—Funeral services were to be held Wednesday for Arnin A. Hug, 65, who died Saturday near Meacham. He and his wife had been to their cabin about five miles from Meacham and stayed overnight Friday. During the night more snow had fallen, and when they started out to the highway Saturday morning their vehicle got stuck. Mr. Hug tried to get it started again, and while doing so he suffered a fatal heart attack. Mrs. Hug walked to the highway where a passing motorist picked her up and took her to Meacham.

Mr. Hug was born July 11, 1904 at Summerville, the son of Henry and May Hug. He was married to Erin Bickford Nov. 5, 1927 at La Grande. They lived in Union County several years and then moved to Forks, Wash. They came to Boardman in 1933 where they have lived since, where he was engaged in farming, raising hay and watermelons.

Survivors include the widow of Boardman; one son, Delmer of Boardman; two daughters, Mrs. Don (Wilma) Wirt of Mt. Shasta, Calif., and Mrs. Keith (Wanda) Ferguson of Hermiston; one brother, Edwin of Meacham; two sisters, Mrs. Jack (Mabel) O'Connell of Lake Oswego and Mrs. Frank (Iva) Veltman of Portland; and ten grandchildren. One son, Dale, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were to be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Boardman Community Church with Rev. Richard Struckmeier of The Dalles officiating. Burial to be in the Boardman Riverview Cemetery. Burns Mortuary of Hermiston is in charge.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in Blue Mountain Area Education District, of Umatilla and Morrow Counties, State of Oregon, from 8:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. on April 6, 1970, at the Polling Places listed below in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1970-71 over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are: the funds are needed to meet the operating expenses of Blue Mountain Community College. The district has no tax base.

NOTICE OF SERVICE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX WARRANTS

NOTICE is hereby given pursuant to ORS. 311.615 of the service of Personal Property Tax Warrants upon the following listed taxpayers. Payment of the following listed delinquent taxes with interest and costs of service must be made by April 14, 1970, or said warrants shall be filed with the County Clerk of Morrow County, Oregon to be entered in the judgment docket of said county and shall become a lien upon the title to any interest in real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued, and the taxes on personal property embraced in the warrant with interest, penalties and costs applicable thereto, shall continue as a lien on all the personal property of the person assessed as otherwise provided by law.
