

City Council Meets, Considers Problems

Very soon the city anticipates launching a replacement program of the old style street lights to the newer and brighter lights. There will be 12 to 15 lights replaced. This will probably include lights on Gale St., Riverside and Morgan. Columbia Basin will work with the city on finding the "black" holes. Bert Corbin, city patrolman who attended the meeting pointed out the importance of having lights on Morgan St. because of the large number of students walking down from the high school. Students arriving home from sporting events by school bus walk to town sometimes at very late hours. Walking areas away from the cars was suggested as a safety measure.

Budget Committee Filled

Council at their Monday night meeting appointed Gene Pierce and Dr. Ed Schaffitz to succeed themselves on the Citizens committee to work on the City Budget. Harley Sager was appointed to fill out the term of Harlan McCurdy and Larry Mills the term of John Venard. First meeting will be April 16.

Keep Heppner Clean

Vic Groshen told of complaints he had received in regard to service stations and garages dumping water and mud into streets from washing cars and cattle trucks. Council reviewed the city ordinance which requires that cars be washed only on the wash racks. Council showed sympathy towards youth groups that use this means of making money. It was suggested that such groups get a permit from the City Hall for this type of bulk car wash.

Council allowed variations to Richard Schmidt to place a mobile home on the lot adjacent to him on Riverside Ave. and to Sam and Ruby Steers for their mobile home to be placed at 175 E. Cannon. A building permit was granted to Dale Adlard for the construction of a utility room behind his mobile home at 630 N. Main.

It was recommended by the Sanitation Committee (McLeod, Gardner and Hollomon) not to reimburse persons for expenses incurred in correcting sewer problems even if the problem is in the street.

Council passed to the 2nd reading the new Ordinance on

Fire Safety Code. Fire Chief Forrie Burkenbine reported he had inspected 17 businesses and had found housekeeping chores the main infraction of Fire Safety. Oily rags in improper containers were also a concern.

The Fire Department has a 1949 Willys Jeep pickup that they have used in fighting grass fires. Fire Chief Burkenbine said he felt it would be better to buy another used pickup at \$1000 rather than try to fix up the old one. A four-wheel drive is advisable on the hills. It was suggested that the \$1000 usually put into the budget towards a new fire truck might be used for this one year to buy a pickup for this use.

Well No. 5 is still under discussion. Council is hoping the insurance money, the \$1400 held back from Foreman and the money the bonding company holds of Foreman may equal the amount necessary to clean out Well No. 5.

Council discussed the development at the end of Water St. Council felt the streets in the area must meet certain standards before the city could accept them if and when the time ever came when they would be asked to.

The meeting adjourned 9:50 p.m.

Thrift Guided Steps Of Heppner Pioneer

(Ed. note: This is a copy of the W. C. Cox story as it appeared in the Oregon Farmer on March 7, 1935).

Thriftness not only helped make W. C. Cox successful in the creamery business in Morrow county, it brought him there in the first place 30 years ago when he discovered that he could travel from Virginia to Heppner for \$5.00 more than to Billings, Mont. The bargain intrigued him and he never has regretted taking it. After three or four years of hard work he went back to Virginia to be married and the Central Oregon county seat has been the Cox family home ever since.

In 1916 after several years' employment by the firm he bought into the Morrow County Creamery Co. and in 1929 bought a lot and put in a \$16,000 plant.

"Just to show you how lucky—and how near broke—I was," he illustrated, "we were down 40 feet on a well for the place and had only a trickle of water when I told them to drill till night and quit if they didn't get more. At 49 feet, the water was gushing and we have 120,000 gallons a day at just the right temperature for washing butter.

And speaking of water, do you see that mark on the wall? That's where the flood stopped last summer. We would have made some money last year if it hadn't been for that—it did \$2000 damage in here. But even so, we broke even and the plant
