IONE—An old time resident of Ione, Mrs. Lydia A. Balsiger, passed away at The Dalles, March 23, at the age of 93. Mrs. Balsiger was born June 1, 1876, in Highland, Ill. Her husband, Paul G. Balsiger (who preceded her in death a number of years ago) started a hardware store here in 1895. Several years later he returned to Illinois and returned with Lydia as a new bride. They lived here until the fall of 1937 at which time they sold their home and business to Omar Rietmann, and moved to The Dalles. They were members of the Congregational Church.

Services were held at The Dalles, March 26, at 2:00 p.m., with the Rev. James McNeilly, officiating, with concluding service at the Idlewood Cemetery in Hood River.

NOTICE OF SERVICE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX WARRANTS

NOTICE is hereby given pursuant to ORS. 311.615 of the service of Personal Property Tax Warrants upon the following listed taxpayers. Payment of the following listed delinquent taxes with interest and costs of service must be made by April 14, 1970, or said warrants shall be filed with the County Clerk of Morrow County, Oregon to be entered in the judgment docket of said county and shall become a lien upon the title to any interest in real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued, and the taxes on personal property embraced in the warrant with interest, penalties and costs applicable thereto, shall continue as a lien on all the personal property of the person assessed as otherwise provided by law. The effect shall be the same as though the people of the county had recovered the judgment against the person charged for the full amount of the delinquent taxes covered by the warrant together with interest thereon and cost as provided by law.
