"Land Use Planning" was the subject for the Home Extension Unit meeting held last Thursday in the 4-H building. Mrs. Mel Allyn and Mrs. Arthur Allen were leaders. Harold Kerr of Heppner, county extension agent, showed slides of zoned and unzoned communities.

It was explained that zoning is a two-part program. First, that the community is divided by means of a local zoning ordinance into suitable kinds of districts or zones for different general uses. Second, that within each zone local regulations are applied to limit dimensions of buildings, the size of the building lots used for non-farm purposes and the part of the tract that can be covered by buildings, density of population, and the broad purposes for which the buildings and land may be used. It was also brought out how zoning could help the farmer.

Election of officers for next year was held and Mrs. Allyn was re-elected as chairman; Mrs. Donald Baker will be vice-chairman, and Mrs. Jerry Meinicke will be the secretary-treasurer. The May meeting of the unit will be held May 14 instead of May 7. The subject will be "Financial planning for retirement".

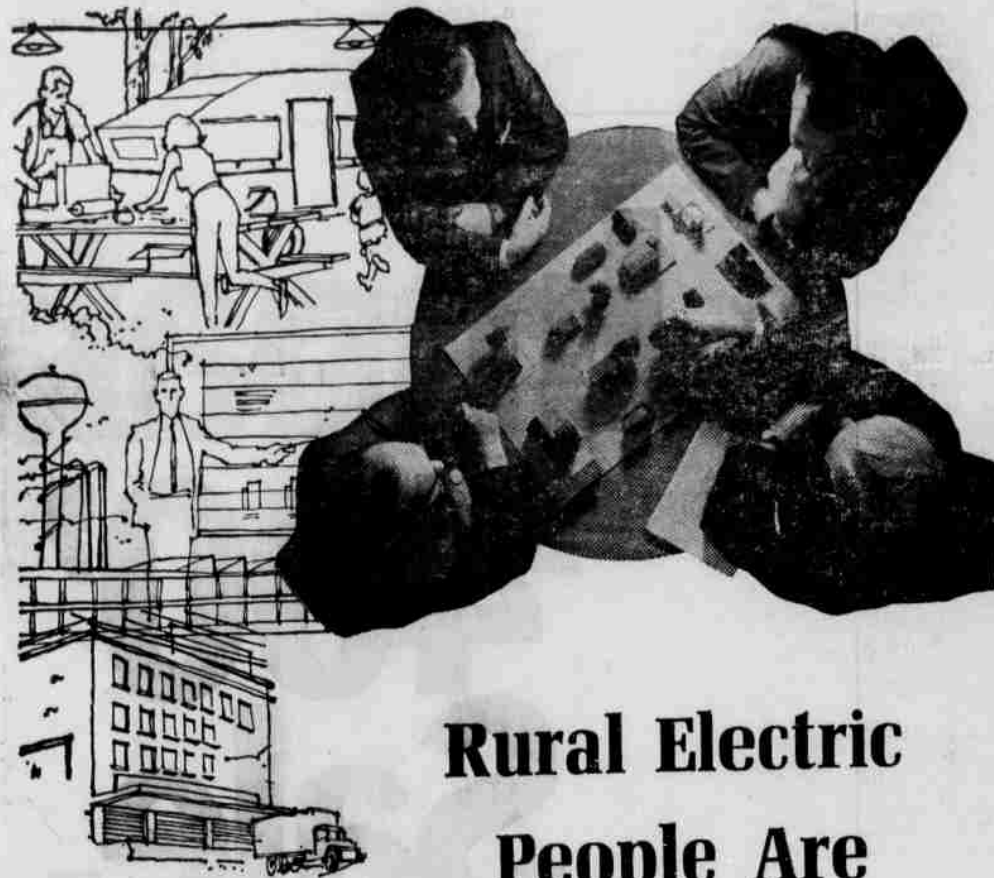
