IRRIGON—A rare viewing of a Comet can be seen here during April between 3:30 and 4:00 a.m. It can be located in the Northeastern sky by its long tail, a very beautiful and unusual sight.

Venus can be seen after sunset in the early evening in the West, while Jupiter, which is the largest planet in the solar system, is in position for viewing in the East. Watch for Jupiter on April 21.

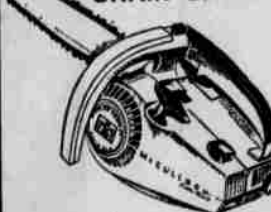
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
