The government has no parity payments.

A carpenter gets \$40 a week and a crop duster is paid \$185 a month. For this reason laborers are not able to own cars. A real good meal is \$2. Rent and food are cheap.

The country is the world's leading producer of wool and lamb. Sheep bring \$4.49 a head and a 2 year old steer brings \$100.

He said a deluxe Plymouth was advertised for \$9,000. A combine that sells for \$17,000 in the U.S.A. would sell for \$24,000 over there.

Gasoline is about 25% cheaper over there. He said the average farm is 400 acres and they have only about 10 tractors in Australia.

People are very cordial and hospitable and they enjoyed visiting a number of farms and ranches. He feels we can learn a great deal from the Australians, tax-wise.

Mrs. Palmer gave the program on "Constructive Gashing" with a demonstration of air layering (to propagate new plants) on her Magnolia (Niger) tree which has many buds ready to burst into bloom. This is an unusual plant for this part of the country but her tree has been flourishing in a protected spot on the south side of her home.

In air-layering a gash is made in a twig, which is propped open with damp sphagnum moss. The injured surface is then enclosed by more soaked sphagnum.

County Pupils to Get Their Shots

A second immunization clinic and a tuberculosis case-finding program are planned for April in Morrow County Schools under direction of Dr. L. D. Tibbles, Morrow County Health Officer. A signed consent slip from the parent or guardian is necessary before the tests or immunizations can be given.

Grades scheduled for tuberculosis time testing are One, Seven and Twelve. Immunizations are available to all grades with parental consent.

Materials for tuberculin time testing are provided by the Morrow County Council, Eastern Region, Oregon Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association through the sale of Christmas seals.

Proposed Schedule for the Clinic is as Follows:

Tuesday, April 21 at 8:45 a.m.—Ione Schools; 10:15 a.m. at A. C. Houghton School at Irigoin; 11:00 a.m. at Riverside Jr.-Sr. High School at Boardman. Tuesday, April 28 at 8:45 a.m. at Heppner Grade School with Heppner High School to follow.

Tuberculin tests must be read 48-72 hours after the administration of the tests.

Immunizations available will include DPT, DT and Smallpox vaccination. Oral Polio vaccine is being offered to grades one and two only in this year's program.

Parents of Heppner kindergarten, second session children due to receive immunizations are asked to bring the child to the grade school building at 9:00 a.m. on clinic day.

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
