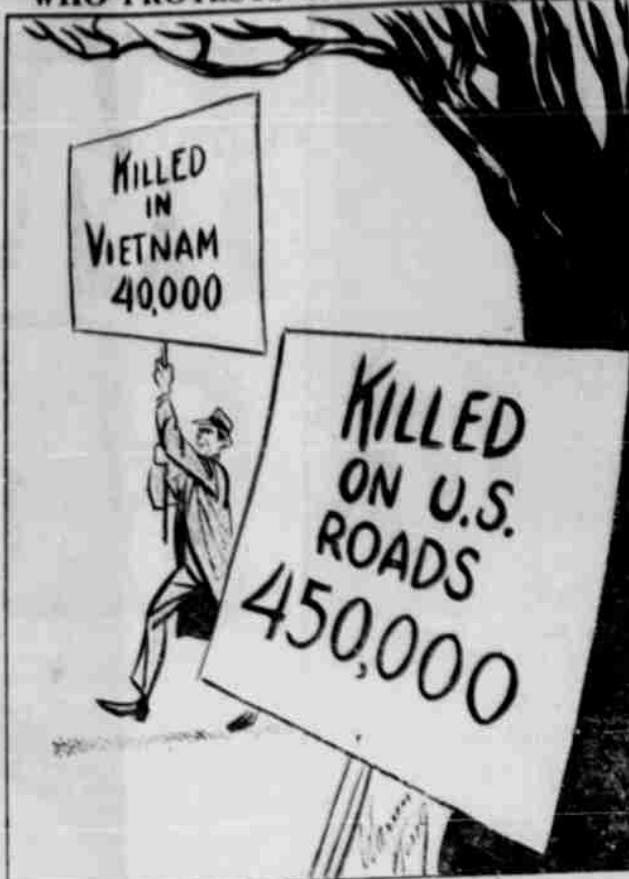

Mr. Nickerson was born Nov. 14, 1881 in St. Joseph, Mo. He was married to Sarah Jane Beddes Sept. 3, 1903 in Victor, Idaho. They came to Boardman in 1926. They moved to Yakima, Wash. in 1928 and lived there a year, returning to Boardman to live until 1930 when they moved to Boise, Idaho, to live a year. They then returned to Boardman where Mr. Nickerson lived until 1966. Mrs. Nickerson died in 1954.

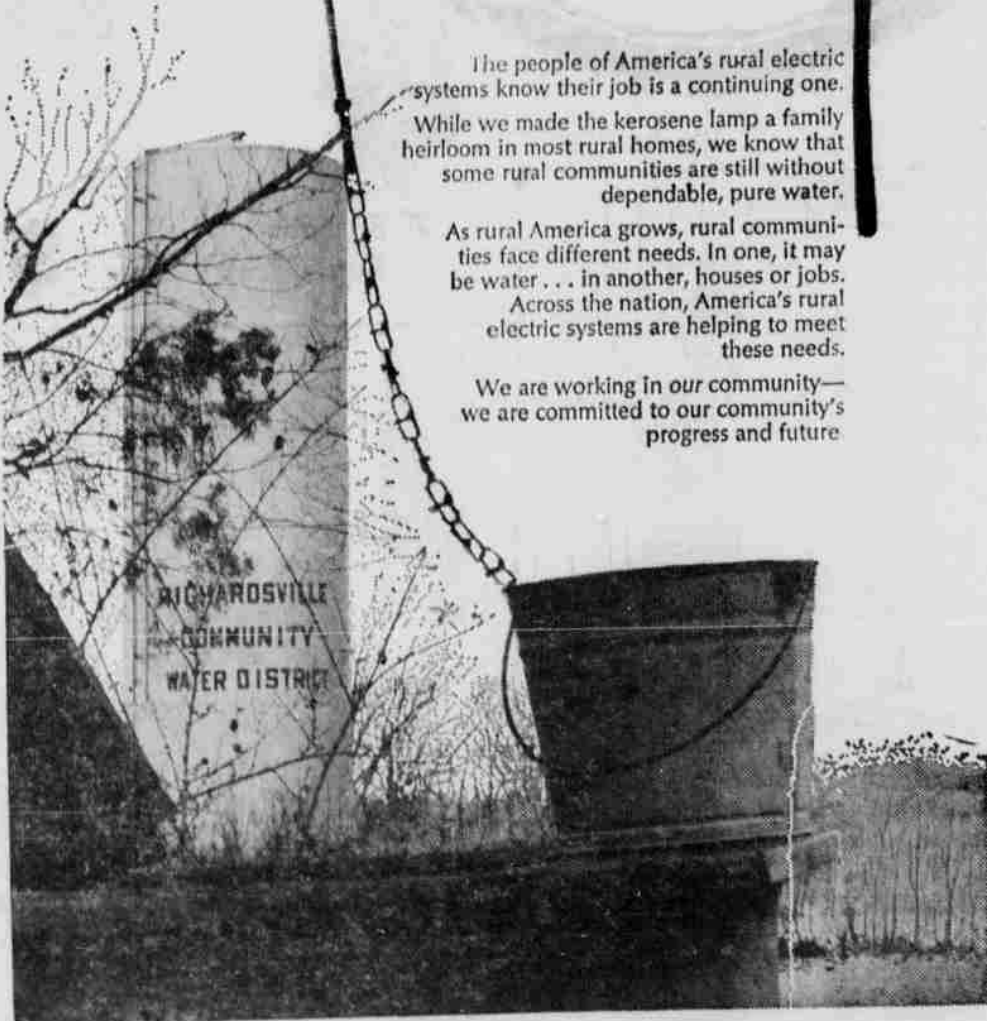

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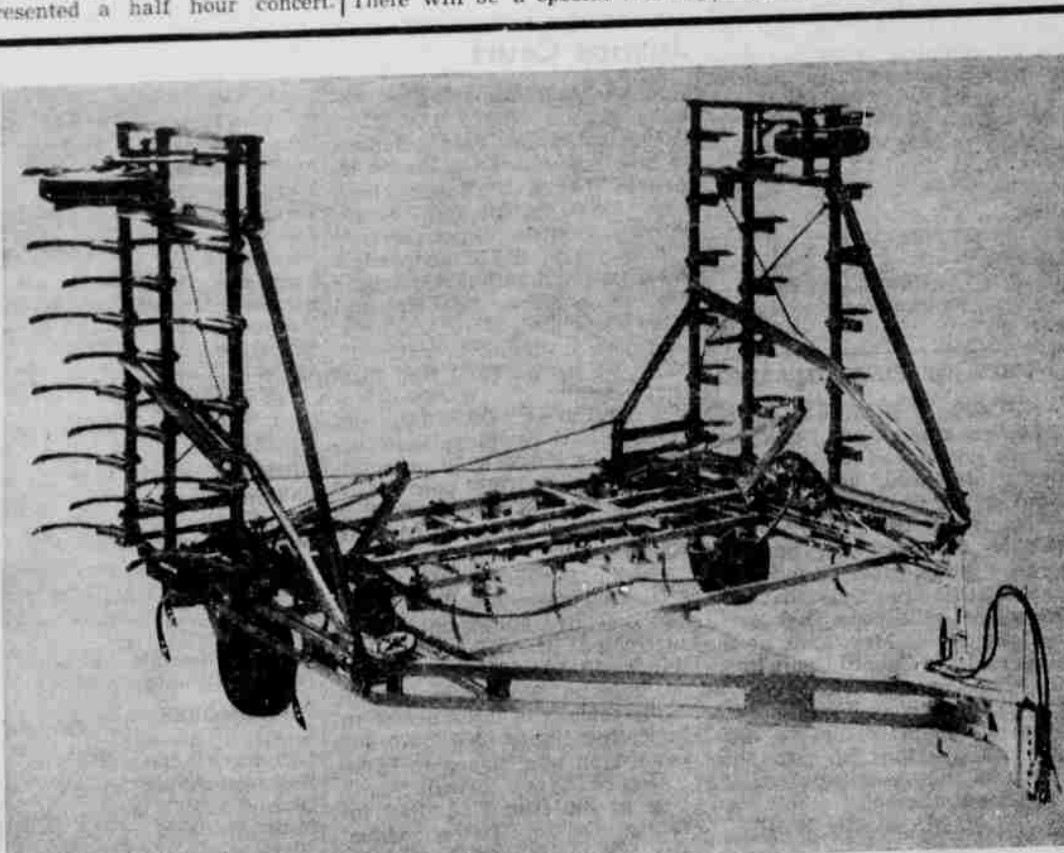
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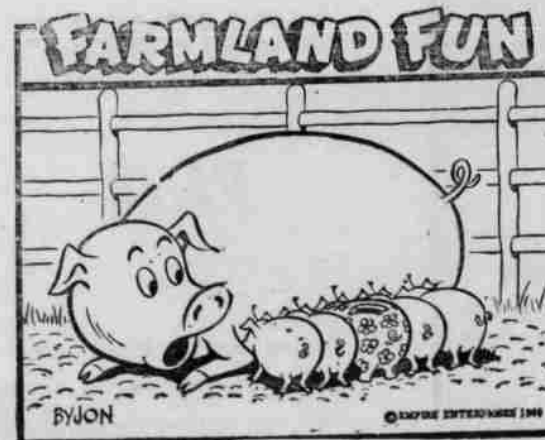
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
