D. A. Warns Of False Ads

District Attorney Herman Winter received this notice this week:

The Attorney General has received information that salesmen of Fire Detection and Alarm Systems are making statements that such fire warning devices are approved by the State Fire Marshal or other government bodies in Oregon and that installation of fire warning devices is required by law in new construction. Such statements are entirely false.

The Attorney General has received complaints involving salesmen of such fire warning devices making false statements regarding governmental approval or statutory installation requirements through telephone and door-to-door solicitation.

The State Fire Marshal's office advises that neither the state nor any other governmental agency gives endorsement of any brand of fire alarm. The only recommendation that has ever been given by any of these public bodies is that the system selected should be approved by Underwriters Laboratories.

Neither is there any building code which would require installation of fire warning systems in construction of a private dwelling.

The Riverside School problem on the final acceptance of the school was reviewed by Attorney Bob Abrams and Supt. Daniels.

The Lawson Construction Company has submitted a list of several construction items on the Riverside High School which they felt should have been classified as "extras" with extra money being paid for the changes.

Mr. Lawson had proposed that these changes be submitted to the American Arbitration Association for a decision on whether or not they were legitimate requests. However, the Morrow County School Board refused to submit the matter to arbitration due to a clause in the contract that excludes arbitration procedures. At the regular board meeting, held on Monday, April 20, the school board indicated that they would be willing to discuss the difference with the Lawson Construction Company, but barring acceptance of the proposed meeting, Bob Abrams, the school attorney, was authorized to take the necessary legal steps to stop the proposed arbitration hearing.

In a telephone conversation with Mr. Lawson on Tuesday morning, he agreed to cancel the request for an arbitration hearing and to meet with the architect and representatives from the school district in an attempt to reach a mutual agreement of the existing differences.

Harry Groshen Passes Judge Jones Alerts To C.D. Program

Funeral services were held in Portland last Friday for Harry A. Groshen, brother of Vic Groshen, Heppner. He was well known here having visited on many occasions and came up every year to go hunting with Vic.

Harry Alexander Groshen was born in Marysville, Montana on March 28, 1899, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor A. Groshen. When he was four years old the family moved to Heppner. Mr. Groshen operated the old "Frog Pond" that was on the corner where Gilliam and Bisbee now stands. It burned in 1918. His father had been in this area earlier and homesteaded on Mallory Creek where Groshen Cabins now stand.

Harry went to Heppner High School. Before he graduated he enlisted in the U.S. Navy with his younger brother, Charles. They were the first two from Morrow County to enlist. He served aboard the USS San Diego where he was a fireman. He was aboard ship when she was torpedoed and sank off the coast of New York. After serving his hitch he went to Portland where he was in the marine supply business for the last 20 years.

He is survived by his wife, Lucille of Portland; two brothers, Victor of Heppner, Edward of Portland; three sisters, Blanche Dempsey and Clementine Helgeland of Portland, Lillie Hanson of Naples, Idaho and many nieces, nephews and great nieces and nephews.

He was a past commander of the Navy-Marine Post 59 of Seattle, Scottish Rite, Al Kader Shrine, Multnomah OES No. 104, Past Patron of Order of Amaranth No. 17, Eastgate Lodge No. 155 AF&AM whose members participated in the service at Ross Hollywood Chapel. Interment was in Riverview Abbey in Portland.

Vic was joined here by his son, Edward of Prineville and they went to Portland together. Another son, Victor Lee of Newport joined them there.

New FHA Officers Go to State Meet

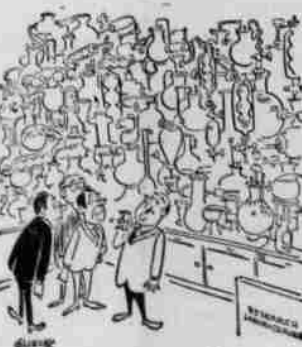

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Barbara's Diary

On to Rotorua where we visited a small Maori tribe and meeting house, of the Maori tribe that settled here. The Maori people first came to New Zealand from the Polynesian Islands and had their own form of religion before the Europeans came. We visited a replica of a Maori village which had been moved from a site near by, to preserve it. It was being crowded out by city expansion. They had an almost perfect communal living. Each family had separate sleeping units and no food or drink was ever allowed in sleeping rooms. There was a large dining lodge and every one ate there. Those who were proficient in food preparation did the cooking, those who preferred or were good at hunting did that. Others garden-ed and others did laundry, weaving and so on.

They had large store houses where food such as berries, vegetables and roots were stored. There were no animals in New Zealand before the whites or Europeans came. They did have birds which were very tame and could be killed with a club. The birds such as the Kiwi and others don't have wings because they had no need to fly from predators.

Much of the cooking, laundry and bathing at Rotorua in ancient past and yet today is done in the thermal pools of the geysers basin. The area around Rotorua is so underlaid with hot steam, one cannot dig a hole even to plant a bush or tree because one might uncover a crevice that will emit steam. In one place a new vent came up in the middle of a parking area and raised the pavement up in a mound about the size of a tub.
