**Ione Schools Observe Earth Day**

All regular classes were suspended at Ione High School April 22 to enable all students and teachers to concentrate on one subject, "Earth Day—1970". Students in grades 7-12 were divided in to five groups with each group studying a special phase of environmental pollution. Two faculty members were assigned to assist each group. Air pollution, water pollution, land pollution, industrial pollution, and population were the special areas of study.

During the first part of the morning students and faculty members worked on research in their special areas. This time was used to prepare reports, charts, graphs, and posters, view films and filmstrips, and prepare tapes. Some students composed and recorded songs, including their version of "Down, Down with Pollution". Others wrote poems and then recorded them with a background of patriotic music. A special slide presentation was given on soil conservation.

At 10:30 Dr. Gerald Young from Eastern Oregon College spoke to the student body on the potential problems presented by continued abuse of our environment. Dr. Young is head of the Math and Science Department at EOC.

The afternoon was spent with each of the groups exchanging rooms every half hour to hear presentations and to participate in discussions of the material that had been compiled and prepared by the research groups. Presentations were made by students and faculty.

"Earth Day—1970" was an exciting and profitable day at Ione High School. If we are going to overcome the threat of widespread environmental pollution we must begin to act. Our weapon in this struggle must be knowledge. Activities on April 22 provided a good basic knowledge of this problem for Ione High school students. The spirit and cooperation of the students and faculty were great," reported Harold Beggs, Principal.

The Ione Elementary Grades 1-6 observed Earth Day in various ways. There were bulletin boards made depicting life in its environment. Reports were written and given concerning pollution, erosion, vandalism, and conservation.

The highlight of the day was a long hike around town with all pupils and teachers participating. This included side trips to the park and creek. Each group prepared for this in advance by discussing and listing things to look for and be aware of. After returning to school, rooms combined for discussion. Much interest was displayed and solutions to problems were suggested. All agreed that the project had been worthwhile.

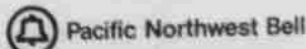
