Special Extension Achievement Day

Events in the spotlight at Morrow County Extension Achievement Day ranged from nostalgia to "Extension—New Directions" to a glimpse of life in India.

The big event was attended by approximately 130 women.

Special Guest Speaker

Roberta Frasier, OSU Acting Assistant Director of Extension Home Economics, spoke on "Extension Today—New Directions".

New emphasis will be on the Quality of Living rather than just homemaking. This will include (1) improving decision making, (2) interaction with others or concerns reaching out in areas such as abundant foods, generation gap, home and community, and male and female roles, (3) community service moving toward public affairs and social planning, (4) economic and social mobility through new programs such as RISE and others. She stressed the importance of the unit program in Oregon. It is reaching a large number of people in all parts of the state, but needs to reach more of the disadvantaged. In 1969, 64,000 special workshops were held—and unknown number of hours given by volunteer leaders.

In looking ahead Extension will try to extend through volunteer leaders and helpers to include all people in the state. Oregon's program planning by local groups is what makes its Extension programs so effective and outstanding.

Doris Graves, chairman of the Advisory Committee gave a slide presentation of her recent trip to India. Indian saris and shawls brought home by Doris were modeled by Sherri Mahoney, Muriel Palmer, Fay Ferguson and Birdine Tullis. Other souvenirs of her trip were displayed.

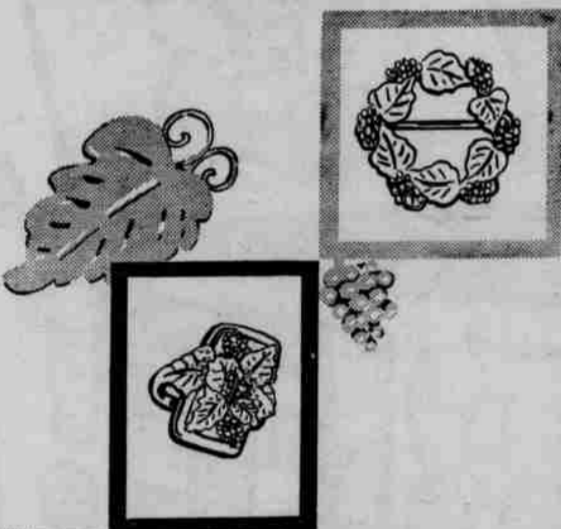
