IONE-LEXINGTON CEMETERY MAINTENANCE DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that a special meeting and election has been called pursuant to ORS 265.120 by the district board of directors of the Ione-Lexington Cemetery Maintenance District of Morrow County, Oregon, the election to be held in the said district and state on the 25th day of May, 1970, between the hours of 2:00 o'clock P.M. and 7:00 o'clock P.M. Pacific Daylight Time, at the following voting place:

CITY HALL, IONE, MORROW COUNTY, OREGON.

At this time there will be submitted to the legal voters of the Cemetery Maintenance District the question of establishing a tax levy for the fiscal year 1970-71 for the sum of \$8,306.48 as submitted by Section 11, Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, which said period commences on July 1, 1970, and ends June 30, 1971. Said levy shall be placed upon the 1970-71 assessment roll and said taxes will be due and payable on November 15, 1970, February 15, 1971, May 15, 1971, and August 15, 1971. The reasons for establishing this tax levy are for the payment of employee salaries, supplies and equipment for the operation and maintenance of the cemeteries within the cemetery district, all as required by the laws of the State of Oregon.

The votes will be by ballot upon which will be marked "Tax Levy" () "Yes" and "Tax Levy" () "No" and the voters shall cross the parenthesis with an "X" in it between the "Tax Levy" and the word "Yes" or between the word "Tax Levy" and the word "No" whichever indicates his choice. 3000 Rainbows in Rhea, Willow Creek Await Anglers Hook

Happy fishin' days are here again with the stocking of 3000 legal size Rainbow trout in Rhea Creek, Willow Creek and Cutsforth Pond last Friday.

This is the third year Chuck Stelling has made this trip to bring the trout from the Hood River Hatchery. Jack Melland, game biologist from Heppner accompanied him as did Mike Golden, fish biologist from Pendleton who is responsible for the fish drop.

Six drops were made in Rhea

Creek with the first one four miles above Ruggs and the others upstream from there.

In Willow Creek about 300 fish were put in at the Alfalfa St. bridge. "By the time school is out," Jack said, "the fish will be down through town."

Two more drops were made up stream with about 300 fish released at each stop with the rest of the fish in the tank flushed out in Cutsforth Pond. Mike Golden, new to the ar-

ea, came over to get acquainted with the fish plants in this part of Morrow County. Since it is so far over Jack Melland has studied the streams' conditions. Streams are checked for gravel for spawning, fish inventory and stream habitat. Willow Creek is fished so heavily by fishermen of all ages from 8 to 80 that planted fish are used exclusively.

There will be two more drops, late in May and the middle of June. The fish survive in a good condition while the water temperature is cool and there is a good flow of water. Temperature of the water at Cutsforth Pond was 45 degrees and the temperature of the water in the truck was 42 degrees. Temperatures should be within 8 degrees of each other. When the streams reach a temperature of 68 degrees, fish planting is stopped. Oxygen content of the water goes down with the temperature rise.

Fish are planted where there's food producing areas and resting areas. Planting fish is avoided in farm lands in order to keep the fish out of the irrigation ditches.

In streams where they will continue to grow, fingerlings which are much cheaper to produce than legal size, are planted.

The men noticed a good supply of caddis larvae which is a staple in the trout's diet in Rhea Creek and Willow Creek. They said that trout aren't too particular and will eat what is available: stone flies, caddis flies, snails, may flies and mosquitoes.
