Anti-Sex Education To Be Shown At Lexington

The state-wide Committee For Improved Education, Portland based since 1964, is featuring its Consultant, Rev. Walter Huss, in Lexington, Saturday, May 16, at 8:00 P.M., in Lexington Grange Hall, 2 1/2 miles north of Lexington. He will show film strips and other materials on Sex Education used in the Public Schools.

Rev. Huss, who is on his 5th state itinerary, states that sex education advocated in the public schools is turning out to be something parents don't want.

Besides lecturing and answering questions on Sex Education in the public schools, he will be showing the documentary filmstrip "Pavlov's Children", showing the origin of the national drive for sex education and the damage done to children. He will also show "How Babies Are Made" which little children have to see in school — that parents have rated as pornographic.

This documentation on sex education proves, says Huss, that too much, too soon, leads to sex stimulation and sex experimentation, and this is what people who believe in morals are complaining about.

Huss points out that some areas are not faced with compulsory sex education, but is quick to add that this is a statewide problem and he will be reporting on certain decisions being made on the state level that will soon effect the future of all 365 school districts and the 452,000 students in the state of Oregon.

Due to documentation presented, Rev. Huss requests that people attending should be either married or over legal age. There is no charge for admission, and the public is invited.

feet in the ground. The edge of the street has been supported with heavy rock. Vic urged Council to give consideration to making the street two-way again. He said there was room for a 22 foot pavement and a four foot walkway.

Mrs. Iva Booker who lives next to a vacant house on Chase street said she had asked children to quit playing in the unlocked house. She is concerned about the condition of the yard piled with trash and lumber and the grass growing so tall. She is afraid of possible fire later when the grass is dry. The Fire Chief will examine the building and determine the extent of fire danger. The absentee land owner will be notified to clean it up.

The Fire Prevention Code was adopted as an ordinance on the 3rd and final reading.

Mayor Collins reported two men from the Corps of Engineers had spent two days in Heppner surveying Shobe Creek. The City had sent in 57 questionnaires on the 1969 flood for a total of \$73,000 damage.

The attorney for the Insurance Co. involved in the Foreman case has asked for an extension of time before Bob Abrams, city attorney, files to renew a motion of default.

Following the regular council meeting, members of the Council worked until 11:30 on the budget.

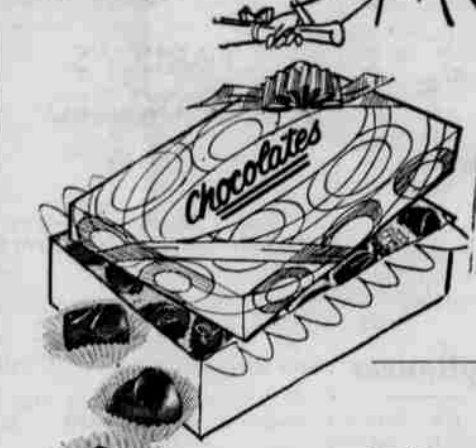
