Townpeople who participated in a panel with each one giving concerns related to their work or special interests were Frank Rasmussen, timber management; Marvin Chitty, wild life and recreation; Harold Kerr, conservation; Glen Ward, game; Mel Boyer, spraying; Mayor Collins, disposal of solid wastes; Dr. Wolff, respiration—pollution of the air; David McLeod, conservation of crop land—wind and water erosion; Tim Smith, suspended particles in the air; Jim Bier, radio active fallout; Pat Cassidy, survival of the race.

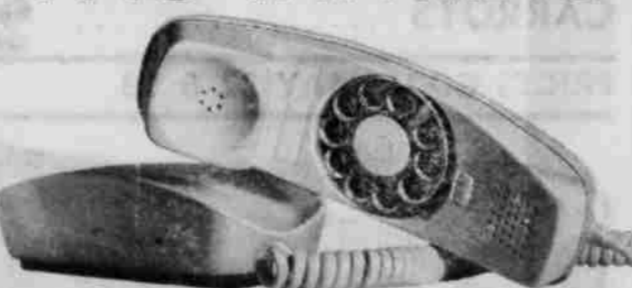
