Applications Due Soon for Medical Career Aid

The deadline for applications for a grant or loan to be used toward preparation for a medical career is May 31. These application forms are available at the county's three high schools and at the county health office.

Completed forms must be returned to the Morrow County Health Council "before June 1, 1970." Letters of reference being sent for applicants should be mailed to Mrs. Delpha Jones, President of the Morrow County Health Council, or to the Morrow County Council of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, Heppner, Oregon, before the deadline.

The outright grant of \$200 and the loan funds will be awarded to successful high school applicants by high school graduation days. Other adults, especially war veterans, are eligible for this help and are encouraged to apply. The loan fund may be divided between several persons.

Health careers include nursing, medicine, pharmacy, therapy, dentistry, dental-technology, X-ray technology, and some other related fields. It is possible for a worthy student to be granted a loan more than once. The grant and loan money will be paid to the award winner's school after each winner completes a satisfactory first year of a four-year degree program, or to those who enroll in a certificate program at the time of enrollment.

Until this year winners were obligated to come back to Morrow County to work. It is still hoped some of these people will return to this area, but this stipulation has been dropped from the application.
