### Kerr Tells Land Use and Planning

Harold Kerr, Morrow County Agent told Soroptimist members about Land Use and Zoning at their meeting Thursday noon at the Wagon Wheel. By law every county must be zoned by Dec. 31 or the state will move in and do this.

He had praise for the Morrow County Planning Commission that has worked for five years towards an all-county plan anticipating the environmental problems of the 1970's.

Slides told the story of the still visible effects of the Old Oregon trail through Morrow County where the ground was packed down so hard that the grain never does as well.

Strip housing has occurred where houses have been built on a perimeter of a field rather than systematic platting. This has left the farmer with a field in the center which he can't spray or follow other good farming practices.

Zoning can protect better better farm lands. Systematic zoning provides official channels where the people can have something to say about how the land may be used. This can prevent a feed lot or wrecking yard or other less desirable type of neighbors from being established close to a residential area.
