Ione Students Compete in Junior Olympics

Six students from Ione met the state qualifying marks in the Junior Olympic Track and Field meet held at Arlington on May 23. Mary Pat McElligott qualified in the running long jump and 100 yard dash. The intermediate girls 440 yard relay team consisting of Melissa McElligott, Karen Crowell, Mary Pat McElligott, and Mickie Hoskins, also qualified to participate in the state meet. Dave Warren qualified in the 880 yard run and Mike Warren in the high jump and 880 yard run. Ione School took third place in the meet.

The state qualifiers will compete in the State Junior Olympic Track and Field Meet which will be held at Wilson High School in Portland on June 6. A number of other participants placed second or third in their events, but did not meet the state qualifying marks.

Doug Beggs Piles up Scores at State Meet

Doug Beggs, Ione High School freshman, scored victories in the 100 yard dash and the 220 yard dash at the State "B" track meet held in Pleasant Hill on May 22 and 23. Doug ran the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds. Only twice in the last twenty three years has the state "B" finals been won in a faster time. He won the 220 in an excellent time of 22.4 seconds. In addition to his victories in the dashes he placed second in the long jump with a jump of 20 feet 11 1/4 inches, and seventh in the high jump. As Ione's only entrant in the state meet, Doug scored a total of twenty-eight points. This placed Ione fourth in the state, one point behind third place St. Paul.

Doug has been a consistent track performer for Ione High School all spring. For his efforts he has collected twenty-seven first place finishes and fourteen second place finishes while competing in the 100-yd. dash, the 220-yd. dash, the long jump, and the high jump.
