Curfew Rules

Some confusion and misunderstanding exists in regard to curfew laws in Morrow County. THE OREGON STATE STATUTE which regulates curfew hours states (1) that no minor under the age of eighteen years shall be in or on any public place between the hours of 12 midnight and 4 a.m. unless such minor is accompanied by parent or other authorized adult, 21 years of age or over or unless the minor has gainful employment. (2) No parent, guardian or person having the care and custody of a minor under eighteen shall allow such minor to be in or upon any public place between the above specified hours. (3) Minors found violating the curfew law may be taken into custody and subjected to further legal proceedings. (4) The parent who violates (2) above is guilty of a misdemeanor. (OREGON REVISED STATUTE chapter 419 subsections 710, 720, 760, and 990.)

On November 1, 1963, Morrow County established curfew hours corresponding to hours in effect in Umatilla County, Oregon and Walla Walla, Franklin, and Benton Counties in Washington. This curfew regulation states that "it shall be unlawful for persons under the age of 18 to be on any street, highway, park or alley, between 12 a.m. and 5 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights, and between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. on any other night, except when accompanied by his or her parent or legal guardian, or in proceeding to or from his work in regular course of employment, where such employment has been approved by competent authorities under procedure outlined by statute. If questioned by a law enforcement officer the burden of proving the right to be upon any street, highway, park, alley or other public place, during the time specified, shall be upon the minor." In Morrow County, the police agencies enforce the five county ordinance.

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PROPERTY TAX FAX
QUESTION: Licensing of Mobile Homes by Manufacturer

I manufacture mobile homes and as of January 1, 1970 had a number of mobile homes on hand. Am I entitled to the cancellation of assessment of these mobile homes?

ANSWER:
Yes. It appears from the language of the statute that the units need only be held in stock for sale, not just by a dealer, but they can be held in stock by the owner as well, in order to qualify under ORS 481.270 (2). The policy behind the laws is that if a vehicle is going to be charged a license fee for most of the year, it should not be subject to ad valorem tax for the same period.
