Fire Causes Power Outage

A 69,000 volt line that feeds the Big Butter Creek area south of Hermiston, a wide rural through Morrow County area and the towns of Heppner, Ione and Lexington had a power outage starting at 5:28 a.m. Saturday.

Bill Gentry, superintendent of the Columbia Basin Electric Co., said it occurred between Jordan Siding and the Ken Smouse Ranch. No one knows the exact cause of the fire but it was surmised that cattle rubbing on pole support guy wires may have caused vibrations that loosened bolts holding cross arms and that the cross arms fell across the wire which caused a fire which caught on a pole of a 3-pole structure burning the cross arm and the top out of the pole.

Columbia Basin Electric boys worked hard on the job of repair, getting the dangerous accident corrected at 8:50 a.m.

He was married to Mattie Gentry at Walla Walla on Aug. 5, 1946. They had the Rood's Hdwe at Elgin for 22 years and just moved back here to make their home in March 1969.

Jack Sumner Again Chairmans School Board

Jack Sumner was reelected chairman of the Morrow County School District Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening in Lexington. Maxwell Jones of Irrigon was re-elected vice chairman.

The board gave instructions to Supt. Ron Daniels to work with the MC Fair Board to obtain complete figures for the drilling of a well at the Fairgrounds. The board is interested in going 50-50 with the Fair Board on this project. Additional water supply would make it possible to put in a different type grass on the grounds. It would be hoped that the grass could be put in as soon as football is over and have a good turf developed by Fair Time. If not this fall, then in 1971.

The board is aware that the Fairgrounds facilities are very important to the district. If the use of the grounds was not available, a duplication of the grounds would have to be built.

The \$1000 usually paid as rent for the grounds would be paid towards the district's share of the cost of the well plus \$1000 left in the site improvement fund when the guard rail going up Morgan St. cost less than anticipated.

Resignation

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Juanita Carmichael who had been offered a contract to teach vocal music in the elementary school.

The following teachers were voted contracts: Miss Linda Neal, Mathematics in Heppner High School. She received her BA degree from Marylhurst College, Brant Ware to teach Spanish and Social Studies at Heppner High. He received his BA degree from Brigham Young.

Dennis Toney to teach Reading and Journalism at Heppner High School. He has his BA degree plus 60 hours from the University of Oregon. Kirk Horn to teach Biology in Heppner High School. He has his BA degree from Pacific University and his MA from the University of Arizona.

Miss Linda Kahr to teach Home Economics in Heppner High School. She has her BA degree from Oregon State.

Bus Runs

June Christopherson resigned from her school bus run as the family was moving to Donald. Pete Cannon was assigned the Rhea Creek run at Ione and Milton Morgan who has been No. 1 substitute bus driver was hired for the Sherer-Zinter run at Ione.

Supt. Daniels distributed suggested school district policies for board consideration. Members of the board were to study them and make recommendations at the next meeting. This is in conjunction with the updating of the District policy handbook.

Areas of study included salary advances, dismissal hearing for classified employees, renewal or non-renewal of contracts for following year, district philosophy on promotion and retention, student conduct, sample dress codes from other schools, to name a few.

Driver training cars will be ordered from Farley Motors and Heppner Auto Sales in Heppner and Keith Farley Chrysler in Pendleton for use at Heppner High, Ione High and Riverside High.

The district will call for service bids, bulk gasoline, fuel oil, and anti-freeze and other items to be opened on July 20.

Chairman Sumner reported on an OSBA meeting May 23 in Eugene. He noted that at one session during a discussion of school financing, he found it interesting that many of them favored a sales tax. He found that from a panel made up of representatives from the League of Oregon Cities, Association of Counties and School Board Assn., each of the three groups had similar problems. They plan in the future have regional
