Irrigon Council Extends Waterline

IRRIGON—A general report on the construction account of the water department at the June Irrigon City Council meeting revealed there would be sufficient funds, after payment of the fire hydrants recently installed, to extend the water line west on Oregon from 3rd and north on 2nd. These extensions were tentatively approved in the May council session.

A letter was read from Mrs. Dolores Haberlein Watson of Medford questioning the city's right-of-way on Utah Avenue at the south end of her property. Some basic grading work was done on this street during the winter and her title does not show a street easement according to the letter.

Mayor Wilson in a letter of reply, which was read to the Council, informed her that the street was a part of the original plat dedicated for the town-site of Irrigon and there appeared to be no record of it having been vacated. However, he assured her that no more work would be done in this location until the matter was investigated and a satisfactory title assured.

The comprehensive water and sewer plan for Morrow County was reviewed and discussed. Some Council members took exception to some of the statements made in the report regarding absence of fire protection for the City. Although not specifically designed for fire protection the feeling was that the water system does add very substantially to fire protection.

A contract was awarded to Langenwaller of Hermiston for auditing the City's books for the fiscal year ending June 30. The park strip along the highway had been cleaned up and mowed.
