Former Irrigon Boy On Shark Study

Charles Bartlett of Lynnwood, Wash., is a member of a team who is making a scientific study of sharks in Costa Rica, for the next 2 months. He left from Seattle June 13. He is a former Irrigon resident and is the son-in-law of Mayor and Mrs. Chester Wilson, Irrigon. His mother Mrs. Anne Weatherford lives in Pendleton.

Other members of the team are from the University of Nebraska with Dr. Thomas Thorson, of the Department of Zoology, in charge.

They are operating out of Barra del Colorado, on the San Juan River, up to Lake Nicaragua. The subject of the study is the bull shark, who are the only known species of shark who are found both in salt water and fresh water. Mr. Bartlett, an electronic technician, is in charge of sonic tagging and tracking equipment. Most of the electronic equipment is designed and developed at the U. S. Fish and Wildlife electronic shop, in Seattle, where he is employed.

Blood and brain samples will be taken from the shark, for study by Dr. Thorson's team, to endeavor to determine why different age groups live in different parts of the river. Pregnant females are found in the river but never in the lake above.

According to Gordon Esterberg, who worked in the same area last summer, it will be necessary to live in a house on stilts as there are poisonous snakes in the area. They will work the river in a canoe type boat.
